Liberals, particularly those of the Maritime Provinces, have long regarded Hon. A. C. Blair as one of the ablest politicians of the party.

Extensive repairs are going forward on the Acadia College building. The contemplated cost is about \$18,000.

In the case of Hicks & Sons vs E. Messinger, Stipendiary Court delivered judgment on Saturday last in favor of the plaintiffs.

The talked of match between the Middleton base ball team and a combination team from Bridgetown and Lawrencetown did not materialize.

The Yarmouth Agricultural Exhibition prize lists are just out. The Exhibition will be held on the 22nd and 23rd of September.

The seventeenth session of the Summer School will be opened at Chatham on the evening of July 20th, under the patronage of the lieutenant governor and the local government.

The American Hotel at Middleton was sold at auction Monday in settling up the D. Fiendel estate, and was purchased by the lease, Mr. Fred L. Shaffer for the sum of \$4000.

Keith Lodge, A. F. and A. M., of Bear River, have recently made some striking improvements in their lodge building. They have now a very pretty and well furnished lodge room.

A straw of coach grass seven ft. in height was brought to the Monitor office last week by Mr. Chas. Parker, who considers it an extraordinary growth for this season of short crops.

It is reported that the government has purchased a large tract of land near Newville and will use it as an annual camp ground for the militia near the present Alderhot near Aylesford.

A match game of base ball was played at Amherst yesterday between the home team and the touring team from Middleton. The Amherst team were winners, the score standing 6 to 2 in their favor.

The act relating to county agriculture institutes under a provincial association as established in Ontario has been received by the local Agricultural Society for distribution among its members.

Schooner Hattie, Capt. Nassas, was wrecked on Holystone, near Sandwich Pt., Halifax Co., during Sunday night's storm. She had on board several tons of coal for the Port Hood Coal Co. Three persons were on board. They reached the shore with difficulty.

A working train on the I. C. R. and the engine of the Joggins Coal and Railway Co. collided at Moncton Monday morning. The engine and the working train was considerably damaged, while the engine and four cars were overturned and a complete wreck. Two men were injured.

Master Harry Dargie, the little son of Mr. and Mrs. B. Dargie, at present living on Granville St., met with a painful accident on Monday. He had been confined to the house for several weeks by illness and was able to go out Monday for the first time. While at play he sprained his ankle so severely that he is again unable to walk.

Rev. Chas. A. Eaton, (Acadia '60) pastor of the First Baptist church, of Cleveland, Ohio, the church house at Middleton, with Mrs. Eaton, arrived in Wolfville on Friday, and will spend some days at the Seminary Hotel. Mr. Eaton is just recovering from an attack of typhoid fever from which he has been suffering since March.

William Ruffe is the possessor of a model vegetable garden in miniature. The space occupied is about 1200 sq. ft. Nearly a dozen vegetable crops are represented of a most luxuriant growth, and as an object lesson in the capabilities of a small plot of ground, the garden is displayed with pardonable pride by Mr. Ruffe.

The junior base ball team has been upholding the reputation of the town in that sport of late. On Saturday, 15th, they beat the Lawrencetown juniors, and last Saturday they defeated the Middleton juniors by a score of 12 to 5 with one inning to play. A warrant was issued in the Halifax County Court by Stipendiary McDougall Monday against Nelson Copeland which will be brought to trial for trial.

Coroner Berryman, who held the inquiry and almost fixed the guilt of the murder of Mrs. Margaret Neill of St. John upon two French and bank robbers, known as Brown and Wilson, now survives at Dorchester for a bank robbery. Charles Levesley, has come into the possession of further information, and reveals that these men were on the afternoon of the day in which the Neill woman was killed, in that vicinity, says the St. John Star. Certain witnesses are ready to go on the stand should the men be taken out of the penitentiary as tried for the murder.
