Ordered that the report of the Committee on Tenders and Public Property as read be received and adopted.

To the Warden and Councilors of the Municipality of Annapolis.

Your committee on Tenders and Public Property beg leave to submit the following report for year ending December 31st, 1906.

We have during the year exercised as careful supervision over the expenditure at the Asylum and Almshouse as is possible under the present method of conducting the business.

All supplies where practical have been purchased by tender at close prices, the quality also has been fairly satisfactory. Taking advantage of the establishment of a contractor undertaking establishment we have asked for tenders for the undertaking as the institutions. We are pleased to see the progress that both institutions are in efficient condition and the inmates clean and comfortable.

Mr. and Mrs. Hiltz are still in charge at the Asylum and have performed a very satisfactory year's work.

Considerable difficulty has been experienced in procuring suitable help, and some of the time we have been short-handed, which has entailed a good deal of hard work on the Superintendent and Matron. Our Asylum has a good name and has the confidence of the authorities at Halifax.

A change has been made in the staff at the Almshouse. Mr. and Mrs. Lowe resigned charge June 1st, on account of Mr. Lowe's poor health. We procured the services of Mr. and Mrs. John Myers, who formerly assisted Mr. Hiltz at the Asylum. Our former good opinion of Mr. and Mrs. Myers has been confirmed and we have found them industrious, economical and kind to the inmates.

It was quite late in the season when Mr. Myers took charge of the farm. He succeeded, however, in raising a very good crop.

The products of the farm were as follows:

Buckwheat, 15 bushels.
Beans, 12 bushels.
Potatoes, 250 bushels.
Turnips, 300 bushels.
Beets, carrots, etc., 16-bushels.
Cabbage, 700 heads, \$2.00 sold.
Pork Killed, 1373 pounds.
Figs sold, \$23.00 worth.
Beef killed, 400 pounds.
The apple crop was very light, only seven barrels being sold.
