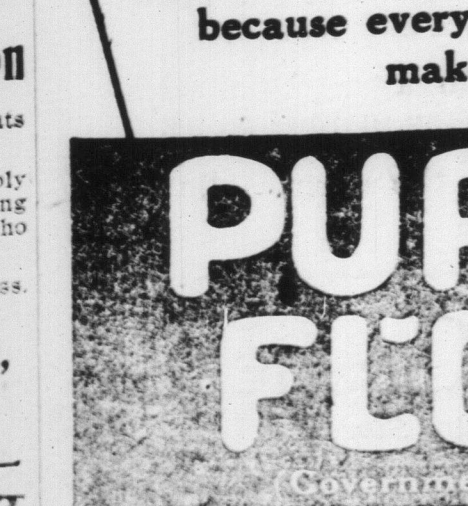

During the fighting around
Cambrai an officer leaped from his
car before a Y.M.C.A. canteen in a
ruined barn just out of sight of the
enemy and ravenously took advantage
of the free drinks, biscuits, and
cigarettes distributed by the "Y" in
the midst of operations.

"There are two things in this war
have earned my undying gratitude,"
he mumbled through a mouthful of
Canadian biscuits, "the Ford car
and the 'Y'."

A soldier, emerging from a "Y"
cinema hut, was overheard to ex-
press himself thus to a mate: "Good
old Y.M.C.A.! There's sure some
lustlers these days. We'd die in
this here hole if it weren't for
them."

Two "Y" officers were working in
one end of the hut when six soldiers
entered the other a little over-
powered by their potations. Their
fluency of expression finally brought
a reproof from the "Y" officers and
thereafter there was comparative
quiet. Next day four of the six spon-
taneously and separately came to
apologize.

A fifth did more. Ten months
afterwards, when the celebration of
armistice again loosed the bonds of
his self-control, he met one of the
officers on the street of a Belgian
town. Whereupon, with a strange
freak of memory, he poured out an
apology for an incident that had
long since become ancient history;
and there on the street the "Y" re-
ceived one of its most superlative
eulogies, to the edification of an ad-
miring throng of Belgians who prob-
ably did not understand a word.

Foreign Credits Have Maintained Our Prosperity

A large portion of the Canadian
public has not yet realized how im-
portant a factor foreign credits have
been in continuing good times.

Sir Thomas White recently said
in Parliament: "Supposing the Do-
minion Government had said: No
money for credits in Canada. What
would have happened? Our wheat
flour, beef, manufactured goods,
cheese, and salmon could not be
sold abroad, and the export business
of this country would practically
come to a standstill."

From whom has the Government
received the money that has enabled
it to grant these credits? From the
people who has loaned it.
If foreign credits are to be contin-
ued, and Sir Thomas says that they
must be, for a while, then the people
must continue to lend their money
to the Government. War Savings
and Thrift Stamps make this easy,
besides they pay well. To invest in
them is good business both for the
individual and the country.

Canadian Trade With France

M. Paul Balbaud, formerly Pro-
fessor of French at the University
of Toronto, has returned to Canada
after four years' service in the
Translation Sections of the French
and British Armies. He comes with
support of the French Ministry of
Foreign Relations through the soci-
ety "France-America" to foster
closer association between the coun-
tries, especially working through a
sub-division, "France-Canada." M.
Balbaud informs the Canadian
Trade Commission that it is hoped
to form self-supporting bodies in
every Canadian city, mutually to
make known French and Canadian
products of field and factory, and
to form groups of manufacturers and
agents for trade purposes. He hopes
to improve the opportunities for
study of Canadian students in
France, particularly those who de-
sire to take up advanced commercial
subjects. M. Balbaud is making a
tour of the Dominion which runs to
the coast.

Dear Mother: Have not as yet
heard from you since coming here
but should in a few days now.
A week ago Saturday our class
went to Malton, Yorkshire, to see
Lord Middleton's Estate. He owns
100,000 acres of land on the British
Isles. When we arrived there his
Lordship and her Ladyship were at
the stables to meet us. They showed
us their Shire Stallions. They were
certainly beautiful, some of them
weighed about 2400 lbs.

Then we saw their pure bred
cattle, then her Ladyship took us to
the Conservatory where amidst a
profusion of roses and all kinds of
flowers to partake of a delicate lunch
provided by our cooks.
After luncheon they took us to
their steed farm and showed us
their hunters and racers. From there
we went to the Kennels to see the
fox hunters (dogs) of which there
were about a hundred. From there
we went to his other stables where
he kept his fatted cattle and work
horses and then we went to his
manor and his Lordship showed us
some nice paintings and he said they
had entertained the King and Queen
in June 1914.

After that they sat us down to a
table full of lots of good things to
eat and believe me they certainly
had an opportunity to see the Cana-
dians going into action, because we
were hungry. After we were through
eating, which was about 5.30 p. m.
the rigs were waiting to convey us
back to the station, so we all climbed
in and away we hiked.

The Lord was a man 75 years old
and rode a pony. Her Ladyship was
not quite so old and rode a Jack ass,
some comical sight believe me. They
used us great and since we came back,
have sent word for us to come again
in June.

We take those trips in every Satur-
day, but are not liable to have many
as good ones as the one I was telling
you about. We are going to Kilmarnock
in Scotland not far from Glasgow, to
take in the big fair.
