BRUSSELS, August 7.—The government has received a telegram from Marshall Foch inviting Belgium to occupy military and administrative territory in the Rhineland region in Prussia, according to Le Soir. These territories were separated from Belgium in 1814 and were assigned to Prussia.

THE LIBERAL CONVENTION

Hon. W. L. McKenzie King the New Leader

The Liberals throughout Canada held a very successful convention in Ottawa last week one of the most important subjects before the convention being the selection of a new leader to take the place of the late Sir Wilfrid Laurier, which resulted as follows.

THE NOMINEES

The nominees for the position of leader of the Liberal party were: Alex. Smith, Ottawa, proposed by J. E. McCall, of Cobourg, seconded by J. MacAulay, of Warton; Hon. W. L. McKenzie King, proposed by Sir Alan Aylesworth and seconded by Hon. Sidney Fisher; D. D. McKenzie, proposed by J. A. Robb, and seconded by Hon. Frank Oliver, N. T. McMillan and J. H. Sinclair; Hon. Geo. P. Graham, proposed by W. W. B. McInnes, of Vancouver, seconded by C. T. Moneruil, of Essex; Hon. W. S. Fielding, proposed by Premier Martin, of Saskatchewan, and seconded by Premier Foster, of New Brunswick; Mr. Smith announced his withdrawal from the contest before the voting commenced.

THE BALLOTING

First Ballot W. L. McKenzie King, 344, W. S. Fielding, 297, G. P. Graham, 153, D. D. McKenzie, 153. Second Ballot W. L. McKenzie King, 411, W. S. Fielding, 344, G. P. Graham, 124, D. D. McKenzie, 60, Mr. Graham retired. Third Ballot D. D. McKenzie also retired from the contest at this point. The third ballot was cancelled because Messrs. Graham and McKenzie announced their withdrawal after the count had begun. Fourth and Final W. L. McKenzie King, 476, W. S. Fielding, 438, Mr. King was declared elected. The voting began at 3.45 and was completed at 7.20 p. m.

SERIOUS ACCIDENT AT LAWRENCETOWN

J. E. Shaffner, of Shaffner's Ltd., Severely Injured

Mr. J. E. Shaffner, of Shaffner's Ltd., one of the most prominent citizens of Lawrencetown, fell from the running board of his car about 7 o'clock Monday evening while going around the back of his head corner, and receiving other injuries which it is feared will prove fatal.

Dr. L. R. Morse was immediately summoned. It was thought advisable to wire for Dr. H. K. MacDonald, of Halifax, who arrived at Lawrencetown via a special train at 2 o'clock yesterday morning. Mr. Shaffner was made as comfortable as possible and placed on board the special which left for the city at 5 a. m. He is now in the infirmary receiving the best of medical attendance and it is hoped by his large circle of friends that he will be favored with a thorough recovery.

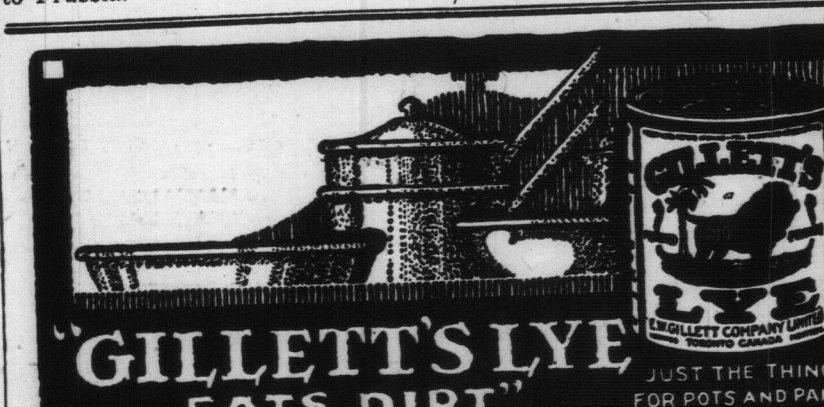

PARIS, August 7.—Upward trend of the dollar is causing great financial uneasiness in France. The dollar on the Paris Bourse last evening closed at 7 francs 57 centimes, having reached 7 francs 76 centimes during the course of the daily transactions. Bon Soir, in its leading article, said that the franc, which was worth twenty cents before the war, was now equal to twelve cents.
