In the event of the Rochester's being defeated in both games by the Pittsburg nine, and the Buck yes by the Tecumseh, then the fight for the pennant will be between the Tecumseh and the Alleghenys on the former's grounds, the winner of which will be declared the champions."

BASE HITS.
