TELEGRAPH ANALGAMA-TION.

On Saturday, last in the Superior Court On Saturday, last in the Superior Court, Montreal, Mr. Justice Pariszu deliv-ered jadgment on the application for an injenction fortidding the Montreal Telegraph Company to enter unto a con-tract with the Great North Western and Western Union companies. He granted the injunction. A meeting of the chare-bolders of the Company was held on Saturday, when the President, Sir House Attan, submitted a report, which re-viewed the recent negotiations which had resulted in the proposed amalgamation. Sir Hoon expressed himself two unable to the movement, provided legal difficulties could be cleared up, that the time of lease be reduced, that no rise in rates take place, that arrange ments be made for payment for stores, and that the securities be made estisfactory.
