BROTHERHOOD OF ST. ANDREW.

A well attended joint meeting of all the city Chapters was held in St. George's schoolroom on Monday evening May 28th. Mr. H. A. F. Mac Leod occupied the chair. There were present besides a large number of Brotherhood men and other churchmen, the Rev. Messrs. Bogert, Snowdon, Mackay, Loucks, Hodgins, and Smith (of St. James', Hull.) After the singing of a hymn and a short service, a well prepared and extremely interesting paper on "Jesus Christ as our example of a manly man," was read by Mr. Charles A. Morse of St. Alban's Chapter. The design of the

paper was to show the perfect "manliness" of our Lord's manhood as possessing courage, humility and nobleness of character. His perfection was manifested in His manner of coming into the world as a child, and growing to manhood as other men. and in the manner of leaving the world through the same gate as every man-Death. The Rev. W. M. Loucks, of Christ Church, gave a forcible address on "Our individual responsibility as Brotherhood men" pointing out the responsibility of every man, as one of God's creatures, towards his fellowmen, of Christians as members of Christ's body, and of Brotherhood men as men who had undertaken special work for the spread of Christ's Kingdom among young men. Both subjects were followed by a general discussion among those present in which several of the clergy and others took part.

On Sunday June 3rd, all the Chapters received Holy Communion in a body at St. George's Church at 8 a.m. There was a very large attendance of men. The stress laid by the Brotherhood upon the proper use of the Sacrament of Our Lord's Body and Blood, is one of its most striking characteristics, and it is to be hoped that such will always be the case. The neglect of the regular reception of the Blessed Sacrament is the greatest blot upon the churchmanship of professing members of the Church of England.

Sunday June 3rd, was, in accordance with the suggestion of the Bishop of Quebec given at the Convention in January last, appointed by the General Council of the Brotherhood in Canada, as "Brotherhood Sunday" to be observed wherever possible, by the preaching of sermons on the work and aims of the Brotherhood, and by special prayers therefor. In Ottawa this idea was carried out in several of the churches.

On the invitation of the Rev. Mr. Quartermaine, of Renfrew, Mr. J. F. Orde, of Christ Church, spent Sunday June 3rd, in Renfrew, and addressed the congregation at Morning Prayer, on the history and progress of the Brotherhood. He was also present at the meeting of the boy's branch of the Brotherhood in connection with the parish. The great interest taken by the boys in the work of the church was particularly noticeable and pleasing.

During the absence in England during June and July of the Rev. Mr. Scantlebury, of Carp, the Sunday services at the three churches in his parish will be taken alternately by Mr. Charles Morse, of St. Alban's, and Mr. J. F. Orde, of Christ Church.
