It will doubtless cause many of our readers regret to learn that this time-honored Society, whose labors for many years pasthave been increasingly abundant, has found it necessary to send forth an appeal to all its auxiliaries for special id to meet an existing deficit in its recurses. The causes of this deficit are et forth in the following extracts from he appeal, which show that it has arisen

rom extensions of operations:

"The Committee of the British and oreign Bible Society have for some time elt that the means at their disposal were nadequate to meet the growing exenditure which has resulted from the plargement of their operations. They are, however, worked on in faith, and ithin a few years agencies have been pened or extended in Russia and Austria, pain, Portugal and Italy. At first the spenditure was comparatively small, utit has gradually increased, until these recountries involve an annual outlay of \$7,000.

"During recent wars the committee ought it right to sanction the sale of escriptures to the military at a very duced price, as well as a free distribute of them to the sick and wounded. It is cost of such a work was necessarily regreat. In the Franco-German war amounted to £16,000, and in the Rus-Turkish it has reached the large sum £23,000.

The committee are most unwilling withdraw from any country which they present occupy, or to reduce the staff colporteurs whom they employ. They ald far rather maintain their work integrity, and at the same time press wards to the fuller occupation of other ds, such as Africa, the Caucasus, is and the regions beyond.

he present year. To meet this demey the Committee have been comred to draw largely upon their reserve
d, which has now been reduced to
1,000, or barely three months expenme, a far lower figure than is con-

sidered prudent in view of the large engagements which must be punctually met.

"An imperative necessity is thus laid upon them to curtail their existing work and refrain from occupying new ground, unless such a response is made to their present appeal as will justify a continuance of the policy by which they have hitherto been guided."
