OUR SECOND NUMBER.

In laying before our readers this second number of the "Printer," we desire to express our thanks for the many tokens of good will and approval we have received from all parts of the country. We have endeavored to keep in view the promises contained in our initial number, and we acknowledge with satisfaction the signs of a steadily increasing trade.

The business of a type-founder, which requires much capital, the largest degree of practical skill, and untiring watchfulness of details, has not been entered upon by the present Company without weighing the prospects of success, but feeling assured of the continued support of the printing community, which we shall always endeavor to merit by a careful attention to their numerous requirements, we have every confidence in the future. It is our ambition to be able to produce—within the Dominion—everything that a printer requires, without troubling our powerful rivals across the line—or the Atlantic—for an ounce of type or material; and to this end we have in preparation some complete series of *Light Face Antiques, Gothics, Light Face Celtics*, etc., which printers have been hitherto only able to obtain through foreign sources, and for which they have had to pay a fancy price. These will be followed by other new and useful styles, which will be shown at an early date.

There are one or two "type-foundries" in Canada, but ours is the only one in which type is really *manufactured*; and although—under the existing tariff—others are able to import foreign type almost free of duty, we are prepared to supply the trade, with our own manufacture, at lower prices than the same class of material can be offered by the importer. A considerable addition has been made to the Electrotyping department, which enables us to execute orders with greater despatch, and at much lower prices than heretofore. Our readers are referred to page 11 for Reduced Tariff.

New Styles of Job Type.

We again show a number of new and handsome styles of Job Letter, which, we need not say, will be valuable additions to the *repertoire* of a tasteful printer. The vignettes, Nos. 1800 to 1805, form very ornamental headings for cards, circulars, etc.

News and Book Letter.

In this number of the "Printer" we exhibit eight sizes of standard Roman faces, from Agate to Pica, all of our own manufacture. They will be followed, in our next number, with further selections of both modern and old style letters, made by ourselves.

Whilst we are continually adding new series of *Matrices* to our stock for *Book and News Letter*, those already in use are being thoroughly *re-justified*, and brought to a uniform standard of accuracy.

This is a work which will take time, and involve much labor and expense; we hope, however, to show in our next number some new and improved standard faces, not to be surpassed by any other founder.

They will commend themselves to the practical printer, not only for their correctness and beauty, but from the fact that they are *bona fide* the manufacture of the Dominion.

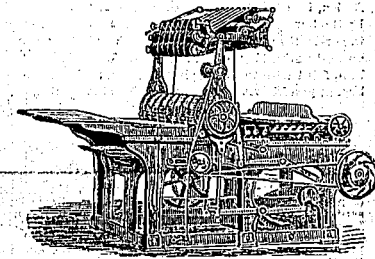
