I would certainly like to drop in at McGill someday again. I had just enough time on the way back from Europe via Quebec two summers ago to go through the remarkable medical building. The difference between imposing and inspiring character and standards which you suggest is exactly what we were thinking of in the purely negative statement rebelling against the imposition. The inspirational process on its face seems to us to proceed so quietly and with so little consciousness of itself that it is almost a pity to call its name to often lest it should flee. What you say about English universities is also interesting because similar ideas come in various forms from various sources. While German universities seem right now to be a stumbling block and a menace, I was agreeably surprised to find Lord Thompson of the Labor Government declaring that the English university was hospitable to its ideals.
