

LARGEST ORANGE GATHERING IN TWENTY-ONE YEARS AS CHAPLAIN

Canon Dixon Preaches Fine Sermon in Massey Hall, Where Paraders Occupied Two Lower Floors.

Preaching to the annual church assembly of the Orange associations of Toronto at Massey Hall yesterday afternoon, Rev. Canon Dixon celebrated his "coming of age" anniversary as county chaplain. He was appointed twenty-one years ago.

The hall was filled even to the centre seat in the last row of the top gallery. After the service Canon Dixon remarked on the fact that it was the largest gathering of Orangemen which had ever been convened in Toronto. Six years ago the congregation barely filled the floor of the auditorium.

The chaplain took as his text the words, "Choose ye this day whom ye will serve." He drew a picture of the English jury system and put his congregation in the role of jurors, each bound to choose on the evidence presented what he thinks true and what untrue.

"There are four pillars of the Protestant faith," declared Canon Dixon, "which are being reargued in our midst every day. They are the deity of Christ, the authority of Scripture, the binding force of the decalog and the sanctions of the church."

"As members of a jury you must cast your vote, whether for or against. I ask you, 'Was Jesus an impostor?' and you must return me an answer."

"Had you been present, with Pilate, yes, and with Peter, at the trial of Jesus, what course would you have taken? Pilate evaded the issue—I am innocent of the blood of this man. I have released him and crucified him."

BUILDING LESS THAN LAST YEAR

Slight Falling Off for June, Buy the Eastern Cities Are Holding Up Well.

The Financial Post prints the returns of building operations in 21 of the largest cities of Canada for June and for the half year. There has been on the whole a decrease of 18 per cent below the figures of last year, while for the six months of the year the increase in operations has been 7 per cent. The total figures for 21 cities are: June, 1913, \$9,527,082; June, 1912, \$12,117,421.

Must Stand by Opinions.

The chaplain stigmatized the man who will "bend the pregnant hinges of the knee" falling to stand fast by his own opinions. He instanced Athanasius, Luther and Lincoln as examples of stubborn men who would not give in to the weight of public opinion was against them.

Passing to the Ten Commandments, Canon Dixon propounded, as if to the twelve good men and true of an Anglo-Saxon law court, the question, "Are they binding today?" He referred especially to the seventh commandment and to that one which enjoins respect for the Sabbath.

"And among other ethical teachings," he continued, "they tell us to love our neighbors. Let us then cultivate more and more kindly feelings towards our Roman Catholic citizens—showing them that we are not enemies, but friends."

Church's Place in World. The church, claimed Canon Dixon, is an organization of believers called out of the world to serve in the propagation of the gospel for the conversion of souls. In dealing with this branch of his subject the reverend canon dropped his mask of impartiality and appeared as an advocate before the panel of jurors.

"We know well," he declared, "that if the church, with its radiating influences, vanished from the world it would be as if the sun and moon and stars had gone out."

"We who enjoy so many fruits of the great Reformation—an open Bible, freedom of conscience to worship God as we please, liberty and protection in our homes—we should guard zealously the Protestant principles which grace the other days by God's grace secured to us."

The service was preceded by a parade from Queen's Park and the parade was in every thankful mood by the clemency of the weather. Formed in two they walked to the hall, where they occupied the two lower floors. The proceeds of the collection were donated to the Protestant Orphan's Home in this city and the C. H. Leslie, chairman of the Queen Street Methodist Church, sang.

"INSIDE" DEAL AFFECTS KING ST. PROPERTY

BROCKVILLE, July 5.—(Special.)—A skiff occupied by Mrs. Norris of West Lake, her daughter, Mrs. Isaac O'Neill, and two children, was cut in two this afternoon by a motor boat driven by Town Clerk Dewey. As the skiff emerged from Tunnel Bay leading up the river, the launch struck out from the west side of Mother's dock. Dewey's view of the little craft was blocked until he came upon it too late to stop. The women and children were thrown into the water, but were quickly rescued by persons standing on the dock. All escaped injury.

MOTION PICTURES FOR SECOND WEEK

Undying Story of Captain Scott to Continue at Massey Hall.

A very interesting and dramatic scene in the motion pictures of "The Undying Story of Capt. Scott," which begin their second week at Massey Hall today, is the one showing the little band of Englishmen starting upon the final dash for the pole.

It was on the morning of Nov. 2, 1911, that they set out for the last lap of their journey alone, after all the members of the supporting party left them and turned back towards the winter quarters. That Capt. Scott and his four remaining companions did reach the south pole on Feb. 17, 1912, only to perish on the homeward march is now a matter of history.

Commander Evans, who had charge of the expedition after Capt. Scott's death, describes the parting of the explorers on that memorable morning as follows:

"We halted, shook hands all around and said good-bye. I gave them huge cheers for the little party as they stepped off and then turned our sledges and commenced our homeward march of nearly 500 miles. We frequently looked back until we saw the last of Capt. Scott, and his four companions, tiny black specks on the horizon, and we think that we would be the last to see them alive; that our cheers would be the last appreciation they would ever know."

The motion pictures of this scene were taken at 2:30 in the morning by the light of the midnight sun and are very remarkable. Wonderful views are also shown of the midnight sun itself and of a volcano in a state of eruption, as well as other unusual spectacular features.

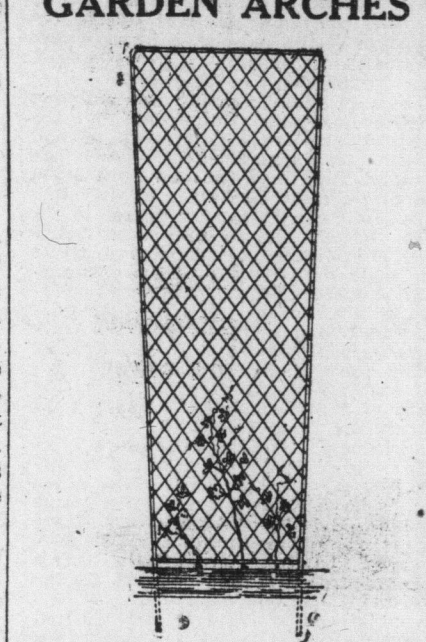

Incendiaries at Work At St. John's, N. B.

Police and Fire Department Worried Over Series of Fires.

ST. JOHN, N.B., July 5.—Fire after fire, evidently incendiary, has been worrying the police and fire departments, and last night one of the worst outbreaks occurred, causing some \$55,000 loss to J. Harvey Brown's cornmeal mill in City road.

A woman living nearby saw a man with an electric flashlight breaking in to the place. She sent for the police, but before they arrived the fire had broken out. Two arrests have been made during the reign. One was sent to the asylum for the insane and the other is held on remand, but the work with the torch goes on.

TEMPERANCE CRUSADE TO BE NATION-WIDE

World's Christian Temperance Conference at Portland, Ore., Adopts Resolution.

PORTLAND, Ore., July 5.—(Can. Press.)—Rev. J. A. Macdonald of Toronto was the principal speaker at tonight's session of the World's Christian Citizenship Conference, his subject being "The Ethical and Economic Forces of War." Dr. William Hiram Foulkes of Philadelphia, who was scheduled to speak, did not appear.

Other speakers tonight were Ayas Hattari, a member of the lower house of the Japanese Parliament, and Dr. William Guy, a missionary from Japan. The session on "temperance" unanimously adopted resolutions urging all temperance organizations to unite on a comprehensive nation-wide campaign for an educational movement and for the calling of a national convention of temperance forces of the United States on Nov. 14 of the present year, at St. Louis, Mo.

Americans Trample Union Jack in Mud

Vancouver Citizens Badly Maltreated the Offenders Who Were Saved by Police.

VANCOUVER, B. C., July 5.—Two citizens of the United States plucked a miniature Union Jack from a standing automobile and trampled it in the mud. In a few minutes a crowd of a thousand people gathered and the offenders were badly maltreated, being saved from serious injury only by the police.

The affair occurred in a congested district in the east end, where there is a large alien population, and a serious riot was narrowly averted.
