

LEAFS DROP FIRST TO GRAYS:: BEAVERS NOSE OF THE YANKEES

LEAFS MADE ROOTS BEHIND HEARN BAILEY GIVEN GRAND SUPPORT

With Manager Kelley Absent
the Leafs Are Prey for the
Grays in the Opening Game
at Providence.

PROVIDENCE, R.I., June 26.—(Special)—With Manager Joe Kelley absent, the Leafs fell before the Grays this afternoon, the Donovan tribe winning a fast game by a score of 3 to 2. Bill Bailey remained to form and pitched his best game for weeks, in fact he pitched the only game he has in weeks, about all his starts for months having been disastrous. He had everything, including great speed and a very punning look to the ball, that had the Toronto players during the greater part of the game.

For the first six innings the Leafs got the ball out of the diamond but twice, both being on two-base drives by Fisher and Kelly. His support was the finest kind also, and the locals, by playing grand ball in the field, helped him out of several bad places. Hearn looked like the best bet for the Leafs, and with the support accorded Bailey, might have won his game, as errors of one kind or another counted in every run except the last one, Piate's terrific wallop over Wilson's head. All of the visitors' errors were costly, and Hearn's own wild play, followed by a wild pitch in the first inning, put the Grays on easy street, and they were never seriously troubled after that.

Hearn made a great smash over Powell's head in the seventh inning that looked good for a home run, but was cut off by a terrific clip for a 300-pounder. Powell got the ball as it came out of the fence and by a grand throw landed it in Wright's hands, who threw was high, but Jack Onslow pulled it out of the air with the gloved hand and fell on Hearn as he slid into the plate, getting him by a close decision. Hearn was winded by the hurt run and it was while he was mending his bellows that Piate got his home run, landing on a slow one with a tremendous swing.

Fisher hit for a double in the first inning and Piate walked, and a double steal and Jordan fanned. Piate's hit was the only one that counted, as Onslow's bunt over Fitzpatrick's head, Shea sacrificed, and both scored on the plate on a wild pitch. With two strikes on Piate in the second, Bailey passed him, and the second on Kelly's two-bagger. The Leafs' first run was made when Hearn kicked in with his triple, Wilson having singled. Powell hit safely to right in the second, was sacrificed, and Piate walked, and tallied when Fisher fumbled Piate's drive after Bailey had fanned.
