## NEW MAN ELECTED MAYOR OF OTTAWA

Taylor McVeity Defeated by Nelson D. Porter, Head of "New Administration."

## FOUR HUNDRED AHEAD

Porter Ticket Has Majority in City Council and on Board of Control.

Canadian Press Despatch. OTTAWA, Jan. 4.—Nelson D. Porter, real estate and financial agent, was today elected mayor of Ottawa at the head of a "new administration" which he defeated Taylor McVeity, former city solicitor, who has held the office for a year, by a majority of 486. On the board of control and in the city council Mr. Porter has a majority. The vote for mayor was: McVeity, 7,104; Porter, 7,590. The following were elected to the board of control: James A. ## ELECTION SURPRISES AT SAULT STE. MARIE

Ald. McPhail Elected Mayor Over Ex-Mayor Munro—Sixteen Ran for Aldermen.

Special to The Toronto World. SAULT STE. MARIE, Ont., Jan. 4.—With the largest number of candidates in the history of this city, the voting today resulted in a number of surprises in successful candidates. The majority candidate, Ald. J. A. McPhail defeated Ald. W. H. Munro, who was mayor of the city two years ago, by a majority of 188. The new mayor is a prominent member of the legal profession and a lieutenant in the 51st Soo Rifles, and in addition, has given several years service to the city as an alderman. McPhail's vote was 962 and Munro's vote 774. Of the 18 candidates who ran in the election, 16 were elected to the council. The candidates elected were: Dr. A. Sinclair, Dr. Davey, Labor candidate; P. E. Crawford, former chairman of the board of health committee; Joe O'Boyle, C. B. Smith, Thomas Dean, returned; Dr. McQuaid and G. R. Sims, Dr. W. E. Gimby, defeated; Dr. Goodfellow, for school trusteeship by a majority of 44. A bylaw presented to the ratepayers to divide the city into wards, carried by a large majority.

## MAYOR JOHNSON WINS THREE-CORNERED FIGHT

St. Thomas Elections Evoke Much Interest—Largest Vote in Years Pooled.

Special to The Toronto World. ST. THOMAS, Jan. 4.—A great interest was taken in the municipal elections in St. Thomas today, and the largest vote for years was pooled. All the candidates worked hard and the fight for the mayorship was especially keen. Marshall B. Johnson being elected mayor in the three-cornered fight by a majority of 218. The votes were as follows: M. B. Johnson 1017, Gilbert Roche 728, and W. E. Crocker 484. For water commissioner, George W. Crocker was elected over Dr. Fred Guest. Mr. Crocker had a majority of 298 votes. The following aldermen were elected: Frank L. Brinkman, John W. Chantler, Colin A. Hammond, W. E. Horton, W. E. Jackson, R. H. Martin, Patrick McEahan, T. S. Poole, L. O. Pearson and W. Trot. Seven of the old council were re-elected with four new members. Ald. C. A. Hammond headed the poll. The school trustees elected were: G. A. Anderson, Dr. E. W. Honsinger, Fred W. Wright, A. E. Medcalf and L. M. Miller. Two members of the old board were re-elected.

## NEW MAN IN WOODSTOCK

## VOTES FOR WOMEN FAVORED BY ALL

### Referendum Was Carried in All Places Where It Was Submitted.

In every place where votes on the question were taken, the majority went in favor of granting married women with the necessary qualifications, the vote yesterday's victories were received by the leaders of the women's suffrage cause, being demonstrative of the rapid growth of public opinion favorable to the acknowledgement of the right of women to take an active part in the administration of public affairs.
