

LESSON XII.

THE IMPERFECT SUBJUNCTIVE.

1. Observe how the Imperfect Subjunctive is formed:

<i>Imperfect Indicative</i>	<i>Imperfect Subjunctive</i>
<i>intrabat, was entering</i>	<i>intraret</i>
<i>laudabat, was praising</i>	<i>laudaret</i>

2. The Plural Number and the Passive Voice are formed as in the Present Tense: *laudarent, laudarentur, laudarentur, etc.*

3. The rule for the tense in a clause of purpose is as follows: When the principal verb is Present, put the Present Subjunctive after *ut*; and when the principal verb is Imperfect, put the Imperfect Subjunctive after *ut*.

Translate into English:

1. Caesar nautas convocabat ut exercitum in Britanniam transportaret.
2. Imperator exercitum in insulas transportabat ut portum occuparet.
3. Caesar senatum necabat ut exercitum placaret.
4. Imperator senatum necabat ut ab incolis insulae laudaretur.
5. Nautae in silvas ambulabant ut rem explorarent.
6. Exercitus nautas necabat ut incolas insulae placaret.
7. Caesar bellum renovabat ut exercitum placaret.
8. Caesar in Britanniam exercitum transportabat ut bellum renovaret.
9. Praeda ex silvis in oppidum ab incolis insulae portabatur.
10. Propter nautarum victoriam incolae insulae ex silvis in oppidum praedam portabant.
