ANY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 15 years old, may he thesead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Mantoba, Saskaichewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, muther, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 20 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, sun, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-unpt a quarter-yection alongside his newestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Pust reside upon the nomestead of gre-emption six months in each of max years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erset a house worth \$300.00.
