A ma-jority of the leading issues made new high records for the year and the move-ment comprehended a number of minor specialities. The demand was general-and in a number of instances denoted investment buying rather than mere spe-culative operations, standard Hividend paying securities being sought most keenly. After the movement had carried up prices a point or more in many cases, the pressure of profit-taking sales caused some recessions, without, however, im-pairing the market's appearance of un-derlying strength.
