Attempt to Start New Congregation Leads to Vigorous Protest to Authorities at Rome.

WINDSOR, Aug., 3.-The determinaestablish a parish at Walkerville has stirred up more trouble and a protest has been lodged with the Vatican. The Church of the Immaculate Con-ception at Windsor, of which Father G. J. Downey is pastor, has a debt of about \$25,000 and a mile and a-half from the parish is the parish of Our Lady of the Lake in Sandwich East Township, Father L. A. Beaudoin being the priest in charge. The debt of this church is about \$35,000. The bishop has given permission to establish the Church of St. Anne at Walkerville, between the two old established parishes; and Father Robert has been

assigned to it. Mrs. E. C. Walker had offered to build a chapel to which the Walker-ville faithful would have access. The Windsor church is little affected by this move, but on account of the pro-test of the parishioners of Our Lady of the Lake who are struggling under a heavy load of debt an order has been issued from Rome to stay proceedings. It is also said that the protest includes the old question of bilingual schools and that Bishop Fallon has been ordered to appear in person or be represented by counsel. Monseigneur Gignac, professor of canon law of Laval University, Quebec, has prepared an extended points in dispute between the bishop and his flock.

These arrangements would be based. he added, on calls from various states and his addresses would treat of campaign subjects, not persons. "Then you will make such speeches as the campaign committee thinks necessary for you to make?" he was asked by the newspaper men.
"Oh, yes," he said, with a smile, "if I agree with them."

The governor admitted that he might reach some of the coast states, but that a call from the far west would be a "big order." He expects to begin active campaigning about Sept. 1. National Chairman McCombs has an appointment with Governor Wilson in New York, where the candidate hopes to spend Sunday in seclusion, avoiding the Sunday crowds that flock to the summer capital.

Campbell received his aviator's certificate by the Royal Aero Club of the United Kingdom June 4. He was pre-paring to become aviation instructor to the Australian army.


