CORN AT HIGHEST PRICE OF SEASON

Good Milling and Shipping Demand and Unfavorable Weather Responsible.

Chicago, July 11.—Highest prices yet for grain this season resulted today to a considerable degree from good milling and shipping demand.

Corn closed strong, 2 7/8 to 4 5/8, net higher, with August \$1.58 3/8 to \$1.59 1/2 and September \$1.59 1/8 to \$1.59 1/4. Oats gained 1-4 to 1-2 and provisions 5 to 30c.

Corn traders seemed to be much impressed with indications that there would be free use of substitutes for wheat and especially with the fact that milling interests were competing sharply for good corn. It was said Canadian millers had been buying white corn and had forced the market to the limit up to \$2.15 a bushel, despite rather liberal receipts.

Notice was also taken that eastern shipping had had the last few days, Bullish sentiment received emphasis also from government and state weekly crop figures pointing to widespread need of rain and of warmer weather. Notwithstanding that beneficial showers had fallen in a number of places, and southwest prices showed no important reaction.

Dry weather reports from western Canada had not had a very marked effect, however, were liberal, and seaboard sales only moderate.

Provisions rose with grain and hog receipts, however, somewhat checked the bulge.
