TOWN LINE TAKES STEAMER GOOD BRITISH IMMIGRANTS SNAPS SPARS AND STACKS JUST WHAT AN ARRIVO NEEDS

Howard L. Shaw Reaches the Soo After Experiencing Peculiar Accident.

Sault Ste. Marie, May 26.—(Special).—The steamer Howard L. Shaw came into port to-day after experiencing one of the most peculiar accidents that ever happened to a boat. She was coming about 10 o'clock this morning and the steamer Coralia with the bark Maia, bound up.

The three boats approached each other in such a manner that the Shaw was placed between the steamer and the bark. The steamer Coralia was in a port side in the starboard bow of the Shaw, but there by the anchor of the Maia when the two boats came together. The nose of the boat is also damaged to some extent. Prices of All Grains Rally on Saturday at the Chicago Market—Liverpool Easier.

World Office, Saturday Evening, May 26. Liverpool: Wheat futures closed to-day 1/4 lower. At Chicago: July wheat closed 1/4 higher than yesterday. July corn, 1/4 higher, and July oats 1/4 higher.

Chicago: Carlots to-day, wheat, 5 contract, 1 corn, 548, 383; oats, 187, 76; Northwest cars to-day, 159, wheat 490 1/4; year ago 323.

Australian shipments wheat, this week \$28,000; last week \$28,000; last year \$32,000.

New York, May 26.—All grades of refined sugar were advanced ten cents per hundred pounds to-day.

ST. LAWRENCE MARKET. Receipts of farm produce were light, one load of wheat and three loads of oats, with 20 loads of hay and three loads of straw, as well as the usual Saturday basket market of butter, eggs and poultry.

Wheat—One load of fall at \$1.45 to \$1.50 per bushel. Oats—Three loads sold at \$1.15 to \$1.20 per bushel.

Hay—Twenty loads sold at \$10 to \$11 per ton for timothy, and \$9 to \$10 for mixed.

Straw—Three loads sold at \$10 to \$11 per ton.

Dressed hogs—Delivered light, with prices firm at \$9.50 to \$10.10 per cwt. Receipts were light, with prices firm, but unchanged for all choices, well-dressed lots. Young pigs, per pair, sold at 60c.

Butter—Prices ranged from 20c to 25c per lb. The latter price being paid for creamery butter. The bulk sold at 22c to 23c.

Eggs—Prices were steady to firm at 12c to 13c per dozen. The latter price being paid for selected lots guaranteed to have been laid during the week.
