While not 200 American soldiers and sailors were killed in the entire war, over 2000 are said to have died through neglect in the matter of transportation, food supplies or hospital treatment. The administration of a commissariat and of the hospital service seems to have fallen to incompetent hands, although millions and millions of dollars were voted and any amount of supplies purchased for the very purpose of having this department of the service well looked after. We all remember how the British war administration "fell down" in the Orimean war and the row that was mised in England thereafter. But in England they do these things better now, and we imagine we are not far astray when we say that at least one-half of the war energy of a first-class fighting power to-day is de-voted to transportation, to food supplies and to hospital treatment. Wellington, New Zealand, Aug. 31 .- The report of the committee of the Legislature, just issued, recommends joining the Austra-

in an colonies with Canada and the Mother Country by a Pacific cable, on the basis that if Great Britain and Canada together would guarantee five-ninths of the cost or the work, New Zealand and the other col-onies would contribute the remaining four-ninths, of which amount New Zealand will contribute one-ninth. The committee also recommends that Canada be trusted with the construction, administration and maintenance of the cable, on the understanding that the cable, on the understanding that the cable is to be jointly owned and controlled by the contributors. The report concludes with advising that a conference of the colonies concerned in the new cable be held in New Zealand. 
A Requiem Mass at Manila for Dead Americans and Insurgents.
