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
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
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

The Transvaal, Referring to the Transvaal, the Foreign Minister suid he favored mediation and ar-bitration, but did not deem it opportune to take the initiative, as the powers had not yet signed The Hague protocol. Touching upon the lingering newspaper strictures as to the Fasnoda settlement, the Minister remarked: "Some papers make it a business of dwelling on national humiliation.
