

## PTE. CRAIG WAS TOP SCORER

Opening Shoot at Long Branch on Saturday Attracted Many City Marksmen.

## NEW COMPANY COMPETITION CUP.

Staff-Sergeant McVittie, 48th Highlanders, Makes a Score of 105 in Spoon Shoots.

The shooting season at Long Branch was ushered in on Saturday with a delightful day of sport. The weather was ideal, the light being good and the wind steady and moderately strong from the south-west. The turnout was very satisfactory for a first day, at least 300 men being on the range, representing clubs, of course, the Q.O.R., Highlanders, and Grenadiers, with a small number from the York Rangers and Toronto Rifle Association.

Among the riflemen were a number of young shots from each of the regiments, who manifested considerable interest in their work on Saturday, due largely to the very liberal encouragement given by the rifle committees of the three city corps. The Highlanders opened the season with two spoon shoots, one for the older shots and one for tyros. The separate match for tyros is a new and commendable feature this season; as the tyros had to take their chances with the older shots last season. The spoon shoots will be held every Saturday, as last year.

The Queen's Own will also continue their weekly rifle competitions for tyros, the first of which will be shot off at an early date.

A large number of the Q.O.R., and, indeed, of all the regiments, availed themselves of the practice afforded at the Morris tube range in the Armouries during the winter, and look for substantial improvement in their shooting. The competition among the members of "D" Company, Q.O.R., at this range has been very keen, and a tie score of 103 made by sections 1 and 2 of this company will be shot off soon.

In consequence of the new regulations issued at Boley reducing the size of targets, it is expected that the Dominion Rifle Association, Canadian Military Rifle League, and Ontario Rifle Association will fall into line. The regiments will also adopt the new regulations as a matter of course, and the Q.O.R. are expected to take action thereon as soon as the committee can be called together. Owing to this change, which reduces the size of the bullseye at 200 yards from eight to seven inches in diameter, an order was posted up by Mr. Harbottle for the Highlanders on Saturday, calling for the prone position at all ranges. This, of course, affects the short range only, where the kneeling position has heretofore been adopted. Mr. Harbottle is again secretary-treasurer of the 48th Rifle Committee, a position which he fills to perfection. W. A. H. Pindley is an energetic and obliging as ever, in a similar capacity in the Queen's Own, while Capt. Montgomery of the Grenadiers has been promoted since last season to the office of president of the Regimental Rifle Committee, in token of the efficient service he has given to rifle shooting in the regiment.

The usual badges and cross guns will be issued at the close of the season to non-commissioned officers and men in the three grades of marksmanship.

**Scores on Saturday.**  
The following were the scores made by the 2nd R.A. in the first day's shooting in the Wheeler & Wilson Manufacturing Company's match, the conditions of which were fully published in Saturday's World. The range on Saturday was 300 yards, possible score 25. Results: D. Craig 25, 24, 23, 22, 21, 20, 19, 18, 17, 16, 15, 14, 13, 12, 11, 10, 9, 8, 7, 6, 5, 4, 3, 2, 1. Total, 250. The following practice scores were made by members who have selected Wednesday as their day to shoot in the match: Tom Mitchell 33, J. M. Davison 31, G. Cookson 31. The "offen-days," Wednesday or Saturday, as the case may be, on which match scores will be shot during the season, will be divided equally between the three ranges, 300, 200 and 100 yards, five days to each range.

**Best Practice Scores.**  
Among the best practice scores made on Saturday were the following: Staff-Sergeant McVittie, 48th, 102; Staff-Sergeant Ashall, Q. O. R., 101; Staff-Sergeant, Q. O. R., 98; Major Orchard, 48th, 94; Staff-Sergeant Hutchison, Q. O. R., 98. Major Henderson, 48th, is to the front this early in the season with a string of ten successive bulls at 200 yards.

**Ricochets.**  
Lieut-Col. Delamere has taken the occasion of his approaching retirement as commanding officer of the Queen's Own Rifles to signalize in a generous way the deep interest he has always taken in rifle shooting in the regiment, by donating a magnificent silver cup, for competition among company teams. The match will be inaugurated on Saturday next. There is no doubt the trophy will be highly appreciated and keenly fought for.

**An Interested Spectator.**  
An interested spectator at the ranges on Saturday was Dr. H. Macgowan, late of St. Paul, Minn. Mr. Macgowan, who is a native Canadian, and now a resident of Toronto, is an enthusiastic rifle shot. He has been in the service of the Queen's Own Rifles for some years being a member of an off-hand club, modelled upon the German plan, where the members shoot at a ring target, the inner ring of which is 3-4 inch in diameter. The range is 200 yards. Some fine shooting is done at these matches, but the shooting is not strictly off-hand, as a form of rest is allowed, and especially fine sights are used. Mr. Macgowan has a high opinion of the shooting capacity of some of the old-timers who participated on Saturday.

**Submarine Boat Launched.**  
Cherbourg, May 5.—The submarine boat Stene was successfully launched here today. She is of a smaller type than the Nautilus. She is fitted with a triple expansion vertical engine of 217 horse-power, capable of producing a speed of 12 knots an hour. She is 34 metres long and has a displacement of 100 tons. She has four torpedo tubes. The cost of building the boat was 80,000 francs.

### CONSERVATIVE LEADER WHITNEY READY FOR AN EARLY ELECTION

Throws Out a Suggestion That the Federal Government May Disallow Mr. Ross' Last Act—Thinks the Outlook at Present is Very Bright for the Conservative Party.

What would occur if the Dominion Government were to disallow the act of the Provincial Legislature prolonging the life of this Parliament beyond the time prescribed by the British North America Act? is a question that is appropriately put at this time, in view of the remarks made recently respecting that convoluted piece of legislation passed by Mr. Ross and his supporters in the dying hours of the last session. Such a contingency, said Mr. J. P. Whitney, leader of the Opposition, to a world reporter yesterday afternoon, might arise, and if it does, it will have an important bearing on the next election.

The Conservative leader arrived in Toronto at 4:30, and was seen at the Grosvenor Hotel. He has been keeping in touch with the popular feeling throughout the province since the close of the session, and his visit to Toronto at this time has to do with general party matters. He stated that the Conservative party had not made any definite arrangements for the future, and if it had he would prefer not to say anything about them just yet. "You know," he said, "it is not good policy to inform your opponents of your plans, especially when they take mighty good care to keep you in the dark as to their movements."

Mr. Whitney said that a meeting of the Executive Committee of the Provincial Conservative Association will be held the latter part of the month, to talk matters over, and probably arrange for a series of meetings. "But," said the leader, "we have no meeting in view in connection with my visit at this time, but it is quite likely I will meet a number of prominent Conservatives, as I always do, whenever I come to Toronto."

Speaking of the outlook, Mr. Whitney said he believed the feeling throughout the Province was with the Conservative party, and he had no doubt of the result when the Government appeals to the people. He has had opportunities to come in contact with men who observe the trend of events, and the one opinion is expressed, namely: That the outlook was never brighter. Mr. Whitney said that the intention of the Government, at the close of the session, was to have another session, but he thinks it is more transparent that will cause them to change their minds, and it is Mr. Whitney's opinion that an early appeal to the people is quite possible.

Continuing Mr. Whitney said: "The question has been brought to my mind whether the Dominion Government will disallow the act of the Legislature prolonging the life of Parliament, as it is clearly unconstitutional." "I myself never to appear at a public performance again."

Mr. Whitney will remain in Toronto for several days, but he insists that his visit has no particular significance.

**MARCH OF 25,000 MINERS.**  
Shamokin, Pa., May 5.—Reports from the three districts of the United Mine Workers of America organization, up to tonight, convince the leaders that the anticipated march to Harrisburg, which is scheduled to start on next Wednesday, will now embrace over 25,000 underground coal miners for the purpose of inducing the State Legislature to adopt the following mining bills now held up by the Quaker machine: First, mine inspectors to be elected by the people; second, taxing company stores; third, weighing of coal by weight rather than by car; fourth, weighing of coal by weight; fifth, a medical chest at the bottom of each slope and shaft, so that injured men can receive temporary treatment before being hoisted to the surface; sixth, deputies and coal and coal agents to wear uniforms during times of strikes in order to prevent the company's hired armed men from mingling with miners and learning their secrets.

Secretary George Hartill of the mine district, when interviewed to-day, said: "Whether the representatives at Harrisburg pass the new mining bills or not, we will march on to the capital city next Wednesday."

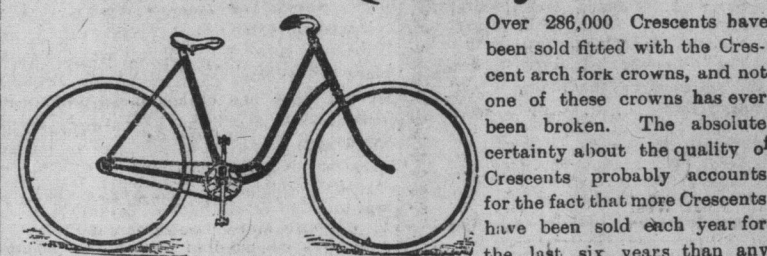
Many local miners are enthusiastic over the plan, and are now engaged in studying the different routes to Harrisburg. The march from three districts will mobilize at Millersburg, and then move in one body on to the capital.

**EPIDEMIC OF SUICIDES.**  
For Three Months Two Have Taken Place Daily—180 Persons Dead.  
New York, May 5.—Suicide has been epidemic in New York for the last three months, no less than 180 persons having taken their own lives within that time, an average of two each day. Among them are several persons whose names have been prominent in both the social and commercial world. In addition there have been many unsuccessful attempts at suicide. Carbolic acid was easily the preferred method of these self-murders, not quite one-third of them using this drug. The fact that carbolic acid causes great pain when swallowed, and is not the strict means of suicide seems to make no difference. Of course, the rare method of self-destruction, shooting was perhaps the favorite.
