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### Czar Nicholas Deceived War Caused By Intrigues

Rise of Bezobrazoff to Power Responsible for Trouble Which Will Be Costly to Russia.

New York, March 1.—The Sun today has the following from London:

Even in nonpolitical England, where clashes of Turkey's interests of her Christian provinces has hitherto bred considerable sympathy with Turkey's traditional enemy, there is no pro-Russian party today. The parliamentary opposition, which interprets its constitutional duty to be "in the government," on almost everything, has not produced a single member to speak against the Japanese alliance or the present policy in eastern Asia.

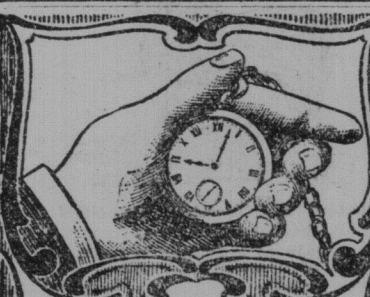
The popular estrangement from Russian political methods is very general, and in the sense that it is universal, it is of recent growth. Lord Salisbury, part author of the Berlin treaty in 1878, which adjusted the territorial arrangements in the Balkan provinces between Russia and Turkey, called the Russian government a few weeks before he took office for the first time in 1895 "bankrupt in pocket and reputation," and was severely rebuked by Mr. Gladstone for using such language concerning a friendly Christian power.

But the same Lord Salisbury lived to say in 1896 that he had "checked the strong horse" in 1878 when he took sides with Turkey in preventing Russia from coming further down into southern Europe.

Nobody believes today that the government is backing the wrong horse in putting all its weight on the side of Japan. If there were any who still had doubts it is tolerably certain that their minds would be made up on the publication yesterday of the correspondence between the British and the Russian governments regarding the Russian occupation of Manchuria and Newchwang.

It is clear all the time that Count

Lamsdorff wished peace, and equally clear that Russia's policy was not guided by its official state department, but by some stronger power in the background. It was M. Bezobrazoff, the Russian Czar's Rhodes.

The record of this man, whose name is not to be found as holding any government position in the Russian papers of the "Almanach de Gotha," is thus described by a correspondent:

"At a moment when Russia was talking no particular action in the far east, this man proved his services to the emperor by securing for him an immense revenue from his far eastern estates. At the same time he obtained for himself the reversion of various concessions."

The success which distinguished his administration of the emperor's private affairs led his master to withdraw him from the far east and to place him in the foreign office as a secretary of state for far eastern affairs. He attracted the attention of the Grand Duke Alexander Michailowitch, whose support he ultimately secured.

It is impossible to say quite who were his supporters of M. Bezobrazoff, but in a little time his influence over the emperor became paramount.

He proceeded to begin the work of precipitating a crisis which would make him under his friends' eyes the ruler of the hidden wealth of Manchuria.

Worked for War.

He represented to his majesty the necessity for peace, while he worked in the interests of war without a pause. Men in high places, officers in the navy and in the army, succumbed to his representations, bought over in some instances,ajoiled by flattery in others, but each believing that this secretary for eastern affairs was speaking with the authority of his czar.

The minister of finance, M. de Witte, now found himself face to face with a fresh obstacle. The success of Mr. Bezobrazoff's policy meant the ruin of the idea to which M. de Witte had pledged himself.

Count Lamsdorff, however, was too astute a man to quarrel with so important a colleague as the minister of finance, and in justice to M. de Witte he was endeavoring to augment the financial returns of the empire.

The heavy burden of taxation had already fallen heavily enough upon the shoulders of the peasantry, and further taxes were announced, which would bring in their train a long series of domestic disasters. M. de Witte, therefore, unconsciously played into the hands of Mr. Bezobrazoff, who, in his turn, contrived to excite the indignation of the Grand Duke Alexander by his specious misrepresentation of the effect upon the peasantry of the financial administration of M. de Witte.

It was useless for Count Lamsdorff to support his colleague, M. Bezobrazoff, having already brought over to his view of the consequences which were likely to happen if M. de Witte continued his financial measures. It was a simple move, therefore, for M. Bezobrazoff to refer the czar to M. de Witte, and in justice to M. de Witte he may be said that he was speaking and acting sincerely in the interests of peace and the commercial development of his country when he urged his majesty to replace his minister of finance by some other official.

A protracted duel between the Grand Duke Alexander, M. de Witte and M. Bezobrazoff on the one side and M. de Witte on the other side continued for months, growing from day to day from week to week, until the minister of finance was relieved of his portfolio. In the meantime M. Bezobrazoff, undisturbed by the result of his intrigues in St. Petersburg, had set his heart upon a war in the far east, and was steadily bringing it nearer and nearer.

Worked for Elsieff.

"Free from a possible incumbrance in M. de Witte, he turned his attention to a man whose sagacity in far eastern affairs had already attracted his attention—Admiral Alexieff. Gradually working upon his feelings by granting him concessions and sharing with him the profits of his far eastern estates, M. Bezobrazoff made him understand that the supremacy of Russia in Manchuria would realize a fortune for himself.

"His action in this respect was singularly well judged, and, despite the protests of Count Lamsdorff and the peaceful intentions of the czar, Russia began again to follow a policy of unexampled aggression. In M. Bezobrazoff's mind there was, perhaps, some suspicion of the idea which had carried away Count Mouraviov when on a map, he saw the magnificence of the empire which lay before him.

"Yet there was something else than this, something sordid, treacherous and contemptible, for it was to the advancement of his own interest that M. Bezobrazoff was really attached. A forward movement across Asia was all he planned, and that step had now begun.

"Unfortunately, at a moment when the success of his schemes had seemed assured, the outbreak of the Boxer troubles turned the trend of events, imposing a checkmate upon his plans. It was, however, by this outbreak that M. Bezobrazoff contrived to accomplish his end, since as the result of the disturbances he secured the appointment of Admiral Alexieff to be at first governor general and then the Viceroy of Greater Russia in the far east.

"The command of the czar's forces at sea was already in the hands of Admiral Alexieff, and it was a step toward war to concentrate in the hands of the same man the reins of the czar's authority. By this means a path was laid for the development toward which M. Bezobrazoff was gradually forcing his country.

Weakness of the czar.

"The history of the subsequent events is almost too well known to need recapitulation. Yet it must be said in fairness to Count Lamsdorff and in calculation of the weakness of the czar that the policy which has been followed in the east is not the policy which had been inspired in the Bureau of Foreign Affairs. None the less, Count Lamsdorff, suspicious of the actions of M. Bezobrazoff, was still powerless to interfere.

"The committee which had been formed in St. Petersburg and which was interested in the far eastern development ignored his existence, refusing to listen to the protestations of the minister of war, Gen. Kuropatkin, or to the heads of the bureau, in whose hands rested the custody of the Russian empire. The word of the committee was all-powerful, their influence was paramount and M. Bezobrazoff saw to it that their orders were obeyed.

"In point of fact they gave an order, since they were already caught in the meshes of the net which he had woven so cleverly. If the prospect of war with Japan became forced upon him, he explained it in a moment with a gesture, with an assurance that the island empire was only defying the majesty of Russia in order to exploit for itself the resources of Korea.

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
