The Latter, Who Killed His Wife, Was Only Six Weeks Married.

Brantford, Ont., Dec. 11.—The Car-penter wife murder trial occupied the attention of the Assize Court yesterday. The jury, after four hours' de-liberation, found a verdict of guilty of manslaughter.

The prisoner, James Carpenter, was married to his deceased wife, Lily, only six weeks. For a time, so far as could be ascertained, the couple lived happily together. Mrs. Carpenter of the couple lived happily together. ter was afflicted with a form of disease, which, it is stated, caused trouble between the man and his wife, and once or twice threatened to separate them. They were induced, how-ever, to live together up to the time of deceased's death. The theory of the crown is that the prisoner beat and ill-treated his wife, and that she died from injuries at his hands.

Jacob Hill was charged with the murder of his stepson, Abram Claus, at Burford, on May 9 last. The prisoner is an Indian, aged 74 years. He pleaded not guilty to murder. The pleaded more guilty to murder. plea of manslaughter was afterwards accepted, and on being tried he was found guilty.

PRINTING PAPER COMBINE. New York, Dec. 11.—The principal manufacturers of white paper used for newspapers, after numerous conferences, have reached an agreement to pool interests and to deal with consumers only through a general agency, which is to be established in this city. The plan forms a national association. They deny that prices will be advanced as a result of the proposed agreement, but contend that they are obliged to co-operate to pre-vent ruinous competition. Thirty companies are interested in the movement. They are to control the in-dustry in the United States.

UNITED STATES CROPS. Washington, D. C., Dec. 10.-The December returns to the Department of Agriculture show a considerable improvement in the condition of the cotton crop as compared with the department's last report. The total crop is estimated at 7,161,094 bales. The returns to the statistician of the Department of Agriculture for the month of December relate chiefly to the products of agriculture on the first day of the month. The farm price for corn, it is indicated, averages 21.4 cents, against 25.3 cents last year. The average price of wheat is 72.7 cents, against 50.9 cents last year. Of rye, 40.3 cents, against 44 cents last year. Of oats, 18.6 cents, against 19.9 cents Of potatoes, 23.7 cents, against 26.6 cents last year. Leaf tobacco, per \$8 35 last year. Cotton, per pound, 6.6 cents, against 7.6 cents last year. The condition of winter wheat on Dec. 1 averaged for the country 99.5 per cent, against 81.4 in 1895; 99 in 1894, and 91.5 in 1893. The returns make the acreage of winter wheat just sown 105.2 per cent of the area harvested in 1896. The estimate, which is preliminary to the completed estimate of June next, makes the area sown for the harvest of 1897, 23,986,470 acres. Conditions for fall wheat seeding throughout Europe, except in France and Southern Russia, are reported generally favorable; increase in acreage probably not great.
