COMMITTEE BACKS UP MARKET CLERK

Holds Mr. Maker Was Justified Preventing Meetings on Certain Parts of Square.

Market Clerk Maker is a sort of "Shoo" Maker. That is, he shoos people off certain places on the market, and thereby gets himself disliked. As stated in last evening's Advertiser, he undertook on Saturday night to move the Salvation Army, the Socialists, and others, from in front of the stores on the market square, and according to Mr. Maker, one of the gentlemen of socialist persuasion wanted to fight him.

Last night No. 3 committee endorsed the action of Chairman Gillean, and Mr. Maker, in the matter, and gave the latter full power to move at any time, any and all meetings or gatherings, to such places on the square as he deems proper.

The committee gave to Beddome & Brown the contract for the renewing of the insurance on the firemen. A change in the insuring of the men was put into effect this year. Formerly the men paid a portion of the cost of the insurance, but this year the city pays the entire premium and controls absolutely the amount of the risk.

The policy is now for \$2,500, and it runs for a period of 100 weeks instead of for 52 weeks, as was the case last year.

The premium amounts to only \$12 per man, as against \$18 paid last year, and \$18 50 paid a couple of years ago.

Campbell & Sons' tender was practically the same as Beddome & Brown's, but as the latter firm has treated the city well in the past, and has held the insurance for some years, its tender was accepted for a renewal.

The men will be given the option of accepting the weekly stipend of \$12 50 a week, or of drawing their salaries when sick on injured, if permanently injured, the policy provides a certain amount of indemnity, according to the nature of the injury, and \$2,500 in case of death.

Inspector McCallum asked for instructions regarding the licensing of slot machines in London, such as gun machines, etc. The matter was laid over until next week.

Regarding the licensing of theatres, Mr. McCallum was instructed to collect \$80, the same fee as is charged theaters in London.

Chief Clerk reported that Ald. Saunders intends to take a trip to several American cities at his own expense, and that while away he will look over the apparatus in the cities he intends visiting. Consequently he would like any contemplated changes in the chemical engine delayed until his return, as he may have some pointers to give the city. This will be done, and Ald. Saunders was thanked for his interest in the fire department.

On motion of Ald. Booth, it was decided to compel the Canadian Fire Engine Company to put the chemical engine in the central fire station in repair. Accordingly the company will be notified that Mr. Wm. Yeates, of Hamilton, the third arbitrator named in the contract, is to be called upon to say whether a latent defect exists in the engine, and whether the company is liable under its guarantee. This move is being made in accordance with the advice of the city solicitor.

The committee decided to grant the request of the Retail Grocers' Association that William Street, from King to Nelson street, be included in the area from which the pushcart men shall be barred.

Mayor Judd, Ald. Gillean (chairman), Ald. Gerry, Ald. Booth, Ald. Garrett, Fire Chief Clark, Inspector McCallum, Market Clerk Maker and Secretary Bell were present.

NEW U. S. NAVAL FIGHTER

The Scout Cruiser Chester Successfully Launched at Bath, Me.

Bath, Me., June 26.—The United States scout cruiser Chester was launched successfully here today.

The Chester is one of three vessels of this type authorized by the act of Congress of April 17, 1904, and was awarded to the Bath Iron Works at a contract price of \$1,688,000, with contract time of delivery set at May 4, 1908. Her sister ships are the Salem and the Birmingham, both building at Quincy, Mass.

The principal dimensions of the Chester are: Length over all, 423 feet, 2 inches; breadth, 46 feet, 3 inches; draft (fully loaded), 19 feet, 11 1/2 inches; depth amidships, moulded, 36 feet, 8 inches; displacement, on trial, 3,750 tons; trial draft, 18 feet, 9 1/2 inches.

The battery is to consist of two 5-inch guns and six 3-inch guns, also two 2 1/2-inch submerged torpedo tubes.

WATCH AND ADDRESS FOR DAN M'DONALD

Fireman Receives Suitable Reward For Bravery at a Recent Fire.

Mayor Judd, Chairman Gillean and the members of No. 3 committee last night presented an illuminated address and a gold watch to Fireman Dan McDonald, who rescued the late James Angus from a fire on Richmond street on the night of May 5. Very unfortunately, Mr. Angus' life was not saved, but Mr. McDonald rescued him from immediate death at the time.

His worship presented the address, which was beautifully engrossed and framed in oak.

Then Ald. Gillean presented the gold watch, which was suitably engraved, and was augmented by a handsome gold chain.

In reply, Fireman McDonald, who is truck foreman at the central station, stated that he had only done his duty, and when he went into the burning building he had never dreamed of being so honored as he was last night.

He declared that Chief Clark is as much entitled as himself to consideration, for the chief was with him all the time in the basement. He thanked the city council and also Ald. Gillean, and he promised to be worthy of the confidence placed in him, which had been expressed by the mayor and chairman.

The presentation took place in the assessment commissioner's office in the city hall, the committee room upstairs having been given over to the flower show.

MOOSE ARE PLENTIFUL

Train Crew on I. C. R. Has Curious Adventure With One.

Quebec, June 26.—I. C. R. trainmen report moose to be very numerous along the northern division. Every day the animals are seen feeding along the track between Moncton and Campbellton. Tuesday the crew of a freight had a rather unusual experience with a large bull moose which got caught in the wire fence a short distance west of Harcourt. The animal was one of a herd of four. At the approach of the train the moose made for the woods. Three of them cleared the wire fence, but the bull got tangled up in the wires. Conductor Sears was able to get near enough to put his hand on the animal, and the fireman attempted to assist the monarch in freeing his antlers from the fence.

The moose resented such familiarity, and struck out viciously. The fireman narrowly escaping being hit. The animal was finally liberated, and was so bewildered that he collided with a barn before striking a clear path to the tall timbers.

GIVE ANCIENT PAGEANT

One Thousandth Anniversary of Founding of Romsey Abbey.

London, June 26.—The Romsey pageant in celebration of the thousandth anniversary of the founding of Romsey Abbey, by King Edward the Elder, opened with a service at the abbey, which was beautifully decorated with white flowers.

Among the features was a chorus of 200 persons wearing medieval religious garments, the women as nuns, with white wimples, and the men as red robed monks, with black cowls.

Among the most typical scenes was the destruction of the abbey by the Danes, and the miraculous apparition of St. Mary, the latter, effected by a clever mechanism, succeeding admirably. The very animated incident acquired undesigned realism by the stampede of a herd of cows from a neighboring meadow, they having been frightened by the flight of the Danes and galloping pursuers.

An other episode which scored was the wooing of Princess Matilda, by Henry on the eve of his ascension to the crown. The love scene was interrupted by a cart bearing the body of Rufus from the forest, where he had been shot.

The driver of the cart was a lineal descendant of the charcoal burner, whose cart carried Rufus' body in 1100. His family have carried on the same trade in the same place ever since. Many of the performers in the pageant, all of whom were Romsey folk, added to the realism of the pageant by an old-world dress and comparatively little affected by modern costume.

TELLS ALL ABOUT MARS

Prof. Percival Lowell, of Arizona, Announces Latest Information.

Boston, June 26.—Percival Lowell, director of the observatory at Flagstaff, Ariz., who arrived in Boston late today on a business trip, announced some of the latest information he had gathered regarding the planet Mars. While the relations of the earth to Mars in their motions about the sun are such that it is usually the north pole that is presented during an opposition, the Lowell has had an opportunity to view the south pole of that planet. In doing so, he has secured some confirmation of what was seen four years ago. As with the earth, Prof. Lowell explains, the snow cap of the south pole of Mars is much larger than that of the north pole and melting of this has been seen under excellent conditions. The cap at first observation was enormous in extent, covering an acre of more than a hundred degrees on the planet's surface. At a second observation this cap had diminished greatly and at its base were certain appearances that Mr. Lowell thought bore out his belief in vegetation there.

Mr. Brimmer appealed against a barn that was sold; laid over. An assessor authorized to take the solicitor's advice. The following names were added: John Storey, tenant; D. Taylor, owner; Dr. McIntyre, tenant; Emory Cole, owner; George Harper, M. F.; John Prudham, P. S.; James Beattie, P. S.; Joseph H. Hendrie, M. F.; George Harris, M. F.; J. E. Withers, tenant; E. Quigley, tenant. Wm. McNiece and Nelson Edwards, struck off. The court of revision adjourned until the next meeting of the council.

The record then took the chair, and Mr. James Campbell, trustee of Belmont police village, addressed the council, asking that the same rate be levied for the use of the village as was raised in 1906. Granted. J. Orlikow was ordered to instruct the county engineer to advertise for tenders for the White Oak and Gore bridges, the tenders to be in by the first Monday in July.

It was voted to instruct the treasurer to forward to the trustees of school section No. 2 a check for \$75.
E. S. Hunt is to be paid \$2.39 for postage for delivering notices to the ratepayers. After a lengthy discussion by a number of the ratepayers of school section No. 18, relating to the petition sent in at the former meeting, a bylaw was read twice, the third reading being referred until a future meeting.

St. Petersburg, June 26.—An attempt was made last night by Terrorists to force an entrance into the magazine of the proving grounds, near St. Petersburg, containing a large amount of explosives. A sentry was fired at and wounded by the men engaged in the attempt, but the shots caused a patrol to hurry to the spot, and the Terrorists fled.
