A Family Poisoned—Sudden Death in Toronto.

SUDDEN DEATH.

Toronto, Jan. 6.—Hugh McKinnon, of 121 George street, dropped dead in the lane in the rear of his house at four o'clock yesterday afternoon. Dr. Grey, who was summoned, found that the old gentleman had been in rather poor health for some time, and that his death was due to heart failure. Deceased was 60 years of age, and resided with his children.

POISONOUS TOMATOES.

Ottawa, Jan. 6.—The family of Wilfred Charbonneau, a Sparks street baker, ate canned tomatoes for supper, as a result of which Mrs. Charbonneau and her six children were all most poisoned. The children have nearly recovered under medical attendance, but Mrs. Charbonneau's condition is yet very critical.

RAT POISON AND BEER.

Montreal, Que., Jan. 6.—Michael O'Regan, a coachman, went into Green Bros. shoe store on Bleury street yesterday morning, and after paying a ten-cent debt that he had contracted, had a glass of beer with the shoemaker. Between drinks he swallowed half the contents of a box of rat poison. He is at the Royal Victoria Hospital, but his life will be saved. No reason is known for the act.

IMMENSE WHEAT DEAL

Involving Nearly 8,000,000 Bushels of Cash Grain.

Chicago, Jan. 6.—Joseph Leiter is said to have closed contracts for the greater part, if not all, of his 8,750,000 bushels of cash wheat. Negotiations have been under way for several days, and are about closed. The buyers are L. Dreyfus & Co., of New York, the French exporters, and G. H. Fisher, of Baltimore. More, G. H. Fisher, the Baltimore exporters, are among the largest cash grain handlers in the world, and stand at the head as a corn house.

IGNATIUS DONNELLY TO WED.

St. Paul, Minn., Jan. 6.—The announcement is made that the Hon. Ignatius Donnelly, the well-known Populist leader, will, in six weeks, marry Miss Marian Hansen, who has been stenographer in the office of his newspaper. Mr. Donnelly is 66 years old, and a widower, and Miss Hansen is 20 years old.

SUICIDE IN A DETROIT HOSPITAL.

Detroit, Jan. 6.—Alfred Payment, aged 32, a patient at St. Mary's Hospital since Dec. 24, died yesterday morning from the effects of a knife wound in his neck, inflicted by himself Sunday evening. The wound came dangerously close to the jugular vein. He got the knife in the pantry. Payment was a grocer for several years in Bay City. The death of an infant, his father and his wife, had worried him for a long time. This, together with business reverses and loss of money through speculation, had caused him to be despondent.

Iceboat Accident.

Five Persons Precipitated Into Hamilton Bay.

One of the Party, a Young Lady, May Die.

Hamilton, Jan. 6.—There came near being a fatality on Hamilton bay Tuesday evening. Five young people had an experience which they will not forget as long as they live, and in consequence of this experience, one of the party may not live long. This person is Miss Amelia Hall, an adopted daughter of Mr. Alex. Hayes, grocer, Victoria avenue, who is bookkeeper in his store. The young lady went to the bay with Mr. Albert Cummer. They had a pleasant skate, and in the course of the evening they met Mr. Herbert Nichols and his sister, Miss Frances Nichols. The quartet accepted an invitation to go for a sail on Mr. James Moran's iceboat. There was a brisk breeze, and the boat glided rapidly over the ice. Suddenly there was a shout; the boat had gone into a hole about half a mile west of Bay street. The young folks floundered in the water, but all but Miss Hall got out in safety. Miss Hall was nowhere to be seen. The big boom of the sail had jibed and struck her on the head, knocking her senseless in the bottom of the boat. Mr. Cummer jumped into the water and worked about the boat, which did not sink, owing to the boom resting on firm ice. He got her out from beneath the sail with much difficulty. Dr. Shaw dressed her wounds, which were in the head.

In the course of the night Miss Hall was attacked with inflammation of the lungs, and she is in a critical condition. She is also suffering from the scalp wounds and shock.

THE MARRYING BARBER.

New York's Sensational Murder Case Pending Out.

New York, Jan. 6.—The case of the people against Chas. Zanolli, charged with the killing of his fourth wife Jennie Sumner, it is said, has fallen to pieces. It was reported in the district attorney's office on good authority, that the alleged insurance swindler, now in the Tombs, will not be placed on trial for homicide.

The chemical analysis made by Dr. Withaus on the parts of Jennie Sumner's body shows that nothing in the way of evidence against the prisoner was found in the woman's body, with the exception of a fluid containing arsenic, which, it is believed, is probably the product of arsenious acid from the embalming fluid.

In the Dining-Room.

FRIDAY, JAN. 8.
BREAKFAST—Baked apples with cream. Bread and butter. Buckwheat cakes. Potatoes chateau. Cocoa.
LUNCHEON—Steamed corn bread. Scalloped eggs with ham. Cabbage salad. Tea.
DINNER—Baked fish with egg sauce. Mashed potatoes. Stewed tomatoes. Bread and butter. Cranberry shortcake. Coffee.

Cut out these recipes and paste them in a scrap-book.

Buckwheat cakes once tested from the following recipe, no other will be used. Two cups buckwheat, one cupful graham flour, half teaspoonful salt, one large teaspoonful baking powder, all sifted well together. Mix with milk into a thin batter, bake on a hot griddle, and serve immediately.

Potatoes Chateau—Cut six medium-sized potatoes into quarters, pare them to crescent shape, wash in cold water, fry them slowly in medium hot fat three-quarters done, drain, then put in pan, sprinkle with salt, pepper and butter, place in oven and bake carefully until done.

Steamed Corn Bread—Two cupfuls yellow cornmeal, one cupful flour, one small cupful molasses, two cupfuls of sour milk, one teaspoonful soda, one teaspoonful salt. Steam three hours. Scalloped Eggs with Ham—One cupful ham chopped fine, two hard-boiled eggs, one cupful rolled cracker or bread crumbs, one tablespoonful melted butter, a speck of salt, pepper, one cupful sweet milk, in which two teaspoonfuls cornstarch have been dissolved. Mix crumbs and butter together, chop yolks of eggs, rub smooth the yolks, then put a layer each of ham, crumbs, whites of eggs, yolks, until dish is full. Pour milk over the whole and bake one-half hour. Serve hot.

Cranberry Shortcake—One pint milk, one-half cup shortening, two teaspoonfuls baking powder. Flour sufficient to mix soft, roll out to a half-inch thickness, cover a large round pie tin. Spread over this a coat of melted butter. Roll another crust and lay over the first. Bake quickly; in five minutes after moving from oven separate the crusts, cover the bottom one with one pint cranberries which have been previously stewed and sweetened, reserving some of the fruit to spread on top layer. Serve hot.
