EXERCISE AS MUCH AUTHORITY AS IN EARLY DAYS.

However-Once Was a Veritable Czar.

"I am master of all I survey; my authority none dare dispute," might have been said with truth by the master of a ship fifty years ago, as he stood on his quarterdeck, and gazed around him over the decks of his vessel and at the crew and passengers before him. In those days no czar exercised more autocratic authority over the liberty, and in some cases the lives, of those under his authority than did a sea captain aboard his vessel, for under the marine laws of that day he was both judge and jury and his acts while at sea were seldom, if ever, disputed. Under changed conditions, and the coming of steam, his power has been lessened in many directions, although today the captain is still master of his ship in every sense, and those aboard it are obliged to obey him, the marine laws prescribing severe punishments for a failure to obey any lawful command given by the master to one of his crew.

"By the common law," says an old English authority, "the master has authority over all the mariners aboard his ship, and it is their duty to obey his commands in all lawful matters relating to the navigation of the ship and for the preservation of good order. In cases of disobedience or disorderly conduct he may lawfully correct them in a reasonable manner. His authority is analogous to that of a parent over a child, or a master over an ap-Conceding the principle that it is prentice.
