ANGLERS INVESTIGATE CAUSE OF DEATH OF FISH NEAR DELAWARE

Government Inspectors Fail To Find Source of Trouble — Chemicals Blamed.

Thousands of dead fish of all species floating in the main branch of the River Thames between Delaware and Kilworth have been investigated by two government inspectors who returned to Ottawa Friday with a report on the situation. This was announced at a meeting of the London branch of the Ontario Forest, Fish and Game Protective Association held at the court-house last night. The inspectors found in one small space 34 dead fish, including carp, pike and minnow. In addition thousands of dead minnows were also seen by them.

Members of the local association, who accompanied the inspectors, stated last night that the cause of the deaths is unknown. At first the long grass now growing in the river was thought to have penetrated the gills and killed the fish, but no trace of such an occurrence could be found on the bodies. Chemicals in the city sewage are thought to be the active cause, and it is likely that tests with live fish will be carried out under orders of the fishery department.

These charges will net the company \$10,000 increase in revenue a month, or \$120,000 a year, it is estimated. The city representatives at the meeting were William Cameron Wilson, chairman of the committee, and Aldermen E. R. Seabrook and F. E. Harley.

It is a known fact that dynamiting fish is being practiced in the district, but this is not the cause of the many deaths, and has practically been abolished owing to the vigilance of those interested in fish protection. The inspectors reported the River Thames to be the most neglected piece of water in Ontario, and the local association will wait on the Government for action.

The minister of fisheries has promised that four members of the association will receive badges of authority for protection of fish and game in the near future. Local badges for the association were laid over until further meetings, owing to the fact that an organization campaign in Western Ontario will be started at once, and a universal button for all associations in the district is planned.

St. Marys, Ingersoll, Dorchester and other district municipalities will be lined up, with a view to forming new associations with London as the headquarters. Pamphlets explaining to school children the various species of fish, with laws regarding catching and protection of some are expected from Toronto in the near future. They will be distributed in local schools, with the permission of the board of education.

Members of the association, J. Eggett and E. A. Heard were appointed a special committee at the meeting to draw up new laws for the association. Assistant Secretary John Botten was delegated to give all information to the public. The local branch is now up to a strength of 82 members.

A., and it was thought advisable to adjourn the meeting to next Friday. At this meeting it is planned to complete arrangements for a city-wide campaign, similar to that which was held in the temperance interests last year. A discussion as to the best means of starting a city-wide campaign took place at yesterday afternoon's meeting, but no definite conclusions were made.

LITTLE BOY RINGER HORSE IS STILL UNDER ARREST

OTTAWA, July 9.—A lively legal battle is being prepared to decide who is to possess a little boy, who galloped home winner in the fourth race at Connaught Park on Monday, June 21, and is alleged to be a "ringer."

The case will come up in the superior court next Wednesday. Solicitors acting for Mr. Fred Bamford of Detroit, who claims to be the real owner of the horse, have appeared over to their client, while the Connaught Park Jockey Club has filed notice of motion to have the horse returned to the club. Representatives of the Canadian Race Horse Association, which authorized the Connaught Park race, are coming here in connection with the dispute. Meanwhile, Little Boy is being closely guarded by men appointed by court officials.

RATES OF GAS COMPANY ARE TO BE GRADED

Charges Ranging From 35 Cents To \$10 To Be Imposed.

Service charges graded from 35 cents to \$10 will be made by the City Gas Company instead of a flat charge of 85 cents, which was formerly proposed. This was announced at a meeting between the special gas committee of the city council and representatives of the gas company Friday afternoon in the gas offices. It was also announced that definite word had been received from the Ontario Government that no increase in price would be entertained until the next meeting of the Legislature.

It was this latter fact which led to the decision to impose a graded service charge. It was thought that the authority of the Legislature. The graded charge will not meet with as much opposition as flat charges which were proposed at first, it is thought.

The proposed graded scale is as follows: Under 1,000 cubic feet, 35 cents; from 1,000 to 2,000 feet, 60 cents; 2,000 to 3,000 cubic feet, 85 cents; 3,000 to 5,000 feet, \$1.40; 5,000 to 10,000 feet, \$2.85; 10,000 to 15,000 feet, \$4.40; 15,000 to 20,000 feet, \$6.15; more than 20,000 feet, \$10.

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MENTION FORD FOR CANDIDATE OF THIRD PARTY

Committee of 48 May Ask Motor King To Run For President.

CHICAGO, July 9.—A movement has been started to nominate Henry Ford for president at the national convention that opens here Saturday of the several political organizations dissatisfied with the policies and platforms of the two major parties.

These several organizations include the Committee of 48, formed at St. Louis last December, and which has been pushing a membership campaign in every state since; the American Labor party, which is essentially a political body as distinguished from the American Federation of Labor; the Farmers' Non-Partisan League; and a political organization of World War Veterans, said to be already growing in several states, and a few others.

Outcome Uncertain.
What may become of the proposal to nominate Henry Ford is uncertain. It assumed shape when Charles F. Hoffman arrived here from Florida, by way of Detroit, Thursday afternoon. Mr. Hoffman was secretary of the Michigan Bull Moose State Committee in 1912, and later its chairman. He then lived at Owosso, his Michigan home is now at Jackson, but he spends ten months a year in Florida, where he has business.

Mr. Hoffman said he had been corresponding with Mr. Ford and had an appointment with him in Detroit for Friday of next week. But he arrived in Detroit two days ahead, and being anxious to get to Chicago, he had the conference with Mr. Ford's secretary, Mr. Liebold. The latter, Mr. Hoffman reported, mentioned that Mr. Ford had been to him what the conference was to be about.

Would Not Refuse.
Mr. Hoffman further reported that Mr. Liebold said Mr. Ford was in no sense a candidate and wanted the convention to clearly understand his position. Yet, if the convention adopted a platform that met his approval, he would not refuse if nominated.

These may not have been the words used, but anyhow Mr. Hoffman says he got it clear in his mind that Mr. Ford, if the convention proceeds the right way, will not decline if the nomination is tendered him.

It is of more than passing interest that the only other captain of industry mentioned for the nomination is also a native of Michigan. He is Charles H. Ingersoll of New York, born in the village of Delta, Eaton county, 35 years ago, and who has made a large fortune manufacturing the watches and clocks that bear his name. Ingersoll is a disciple of Henry George's land tax theories, and holds memberships in the National Municipal Ownership League, the American Free Trade League and in other radical organizations.

Senators La Follette, Johnson, Borah and Reed might all be regarded as likely candidates, but for recent reports that, though dispirited, they are likely to quote Governor Pinckney to "vote their regular party ticket, but hold their noses while doing so."

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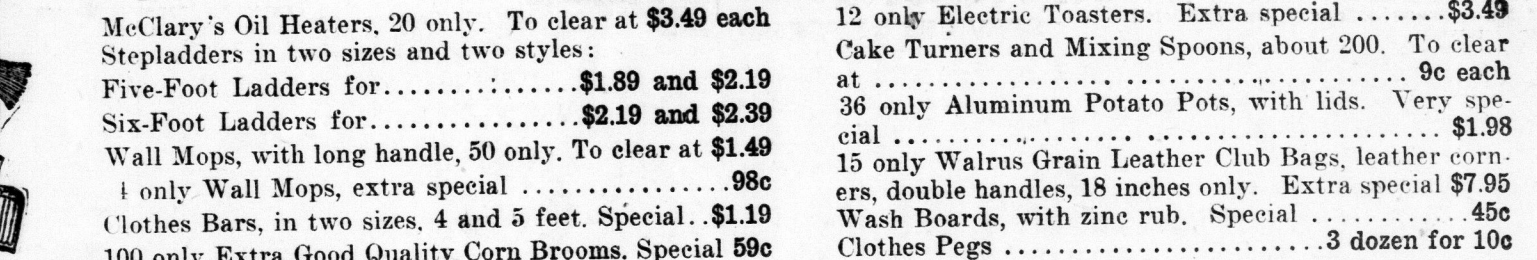
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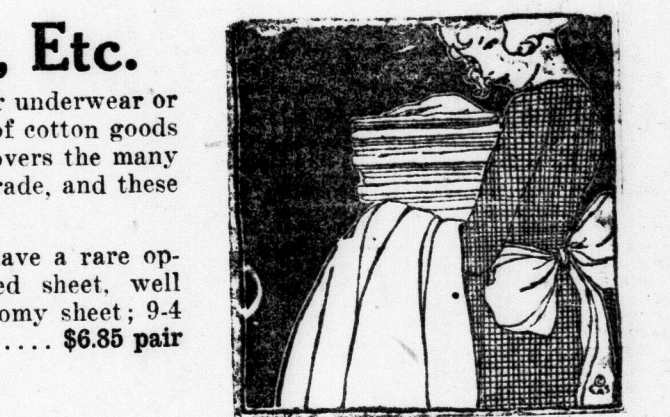
