CHARGED WITH BREACH OF EMIGRATION ACT

Nick Bakulis, Not Wanted by Any Country, Lands in Toronto Police Court.

Charged with a breach of the Emigration Act, Nick Bakulis appeared in the police court yesterday and was fined \$5 and costs or 30 days. Bakulis appears to be in the unenviable position of "a man without a country," since Greece, his native land, doesn't want him, and the United States doesn't seem inclined to accept him as a citizen.

Detective Twigg said that he had known Bakulis since 1912. After being refused admission into Canada from the U.S.A., he had traveled half round the world, reaching Canada under the name of Christopher Smith, in 1914. Inspector Mitchell, the manifest book to show that Bakulis had misrepresented himself on entering port. He had served several terms in prison, one of these being for smuggling aliens into Canada.

A disturbance which is centered near the middle Atlantic coast is likely to cause strong winds or moderate gales off the coast of Nova Scotia.
