The riotous disturbances and martial law does not exist, although the city is under control of Provost-Marshal Mack Osborne, No. 1 military district. However there is much gossiping and many strange rumors of bombs and other explosives circulated among the crowds which congregated on the street corners and elsewhere.

It is evident that there is a deep feeling between the British and German populations, which it is feared may soon become rioting further. It is feared that the store and hotel and in the domestic life of the people. Reminders of the need for vigilance are afforded by the presence of armed pickets at the newspaper office, and at the home of David Gross, mayor-elect.

According to Mayor Hett, who returns to the city tomorrow, there was no rioting during the disturbance any reason for the riot. Along with Police Magistrate Weir and Provost-Marshal Osborne, the disturbance situation and it was not deemed necessary to adopt extreme measures.

As to the cause of the disturbance very little can be definitely established. It is really a factionist propaganda between the British born and the German element. Many statements are made for and against both parties, and members of the citizens' league, which won the elections, claim that the soldiers who figure in the disturbance were the tools of the British, while the latter emphatically declare that the members of the citizens' league are pro-German.

It is held by the citizens' league that there was no provocation whatever given the British soldiers, and according to the information given, after the results of the election had been announced, the soldiers, who belonged to the 1st Battalion, were ordered to leave, formed a procession and marched along the main street. They were followed and encouraged by a large crowd of civilians, cheering and singing patriotic airs. When The News-Record was reached a demonstration was raised at the sight of some of the British soldiers in the office. The bearer of the Union Jack, it is alleged, struck the plate glass window with the flag pole and smashed it. The other demonstrators rushed the office and destroyed the assembly hall.

After some attention to office fittings, the soldiers proceeded to the composing room at the rear. They were retained and ordered to remain until the arrival of Provost-Marshal Osborne and a few military police restored order. About ten o'clock the demonstration resumed, and forcing their way past the guards, again entered the building. A few civil police arrived and cleared them out, but meantime another band had entered at the rear and damaged the machinery. They left with the arrival of the 100 soldiers from Galt, and no arrests were made.

Many Disfranchised. The World was told today that the franchise of the bitter feeling was the result of a large number of the German population. Men who had exercised the franchise for a score of years of more found themselves struck from the list soon after the war started. This deeply incensed the German population and they fostered the belief that a net was being made against them because of their German extraction. They asserted that they were loyal Britishers and that their rights as such were being assailed unjustly. They protest against any accusation that they have any intention of intrigue or are not favorably disposed toward the cause of the allies. For the despotism and the law against which the allies are contending today their fathers left Germany and sought freedom under the British flag.

Add to the disfranchisement, the name changing controversy, and the reason for a situation that calls for the purchase of supplies from Germany, which is being done at very high prices, and such that little can be developed into a great menace to the peace of Canada.
