Monk goes on:—

"We are now face to face with the project of a military or naval consolidation or both and for the first time in a hundred years we are asked to consider this as a duty. Such a consolidation, as I understand it, would necessarily involve us in the responsibility of what would be done by all other nations within the Empire, in cluding the government of Great Britain herself, their acts, their negotiations, treaties, without any right or control of our own, since the scheme does not in any way provide for our representation. War, after all, is but the result, it is the outcome or consequence of treaties, aliances, grievances, obligations and violations of supposed rights.

"A plan of this kind is destructive to the principle of self-government, of responsible government which has been established after years of patient endeavor and sacrifices. If we adopt the project of imperial armaments for imperial purposes, we must, as a consequence, enter into the concert or whatever it is called, of European nations who are groaning under the burden of military and naval expenditures. We must retrace our steps over the road upon which we have been advancing since nearly one hundred years. We cannot do it without feeling that we will regret it, and before long we will be grooping our way back again. We must suspend our work of expansion and development, without which Canada cannot advance and upon which we have been advancing since nearly one hundred years.
