

From the London Times, Sept. 26.

Our Paper of Saturday contained reports of three important political proceedings, one of which illustrated in a conspicuous manner the unaltered attachment of the House of Commons to the cause of that Reform by which its own intrinsic dignity and value, its popularity with the people of England, and its reputation and authority with all foreign Powers, must be so inevitably secured, while the other two transactions furnish even stronger evidence than could have been looked for of the past desire entertained by the wealthiest and most intelligent order of men now existing, for such an amendment of the wretched state of our representation as may compel the executive Government to reconsider the measures which may be proposed for the national tranquillity, to facilitate the pursuits of industry, and to render property secure.
