Staggering Cost of Modern War

Britain Paying \$29,000,000 a Day
— U. S. Refuses Germany's
Peace Proposals — British
Troops Make Progress

Andrew Bonar Law, chancellor of the exchequer, announced in the house of commons yesterday that the average daily expenditure of Great Britain is now £3,900,000. He said the total expenditure since the beginning of the war was £42,000,000,000 or \$21,000,000,000. At the end of the current year, he said, the national debt would stand between £2,800,000,000 and £3,000,000,000. Advances to allies and dominions would be approximately £200,000,000. The amount asked for, Mr. Law said, would enable the government to meet expenses until the end of May. On the last vote of credit there had been an unexpended balance of £70,000,000.

The United States has rejected Germany's offer to discuss differences between the two nations, until the ruthless submarine campaign, now in progress, is stopped.

An official report from the British headquarters in France yesterday told of further progress north of the Aisne, in the neighborhood of the Beaumont-Puix road. The report said that the British troops had occupied some 600 yards of hostile trenches, and in addition took a few prisoners. An enemy attack, south of Serre Hill, was repulsed. South of Arras a raiding party blew up a hostile ammunition dump and captured a few prisoners.

Only six steamers were sunk by German submarines in the last two days and the prevailing opinion is that the campaign will be a failure. Four of the British steamers were shelled without warning and, as the men took to their boats, the Huns continued to fire on them recklessly.

ANOTHER FIRE IN KENNEDY BUILDING

Fire, the origin of which is unknown, broke out through the shaft in the Kennedy building at 80-80 Prince William street, last evening and did damage to the extent of \$40,000, with H. W. 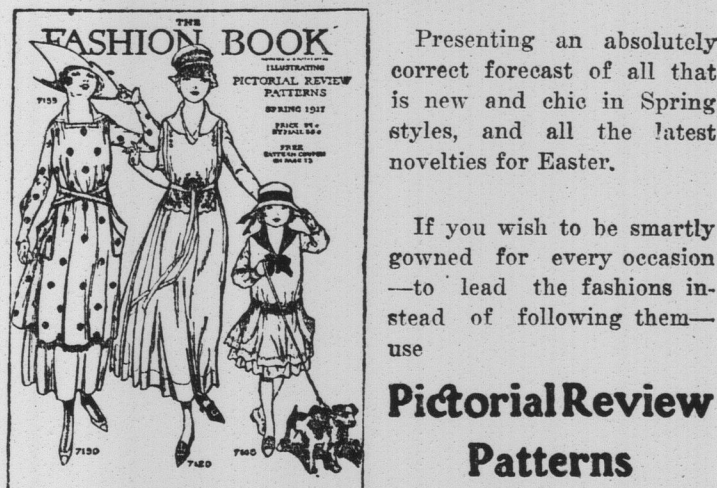
