Brigadier General Macdonell Here to Take up Duties in Command of N. B. Military District

General Archibald Hayes Macdonnell was born at Toronto Feb. 6, 1868, of United Empire Loyalist descent, and is a son of the late Angus Macdonnell, of that city. He is a brother of Senator Claude Macdonell, former M. P. for Toronto. After graduating from Kingston Military College he became attached to the Royal Canadian Regiment as lieutenant in 1890, becoming captain in 1892 and major in 1905. In 1907 and 1908 he acted as D. A. A. G. for the maritime provinces and was D. A. Q. M. in 1910, in the latter year being appointed chief staff officer of the western Ontario command. He was also for a time A. A. G. of the first division and in 1911 was appointed a member of the board of visitors of the Royal Military College at Kingston.

In 1899 and 1900 General Macdonell, then captain, served with distinction in the South African war, taking part in the operations in Transvaaleast of Pretoria and in Cape Colony south of Orange River. He was mentioned in the despatches on different occasions in 1901 and was referred to as "A brave and meritorious officer." During his service in South Africa he was captured by General DeWet and was for six months a prisoner in the hands of the Boers. In 1901 he received the D. S. 
