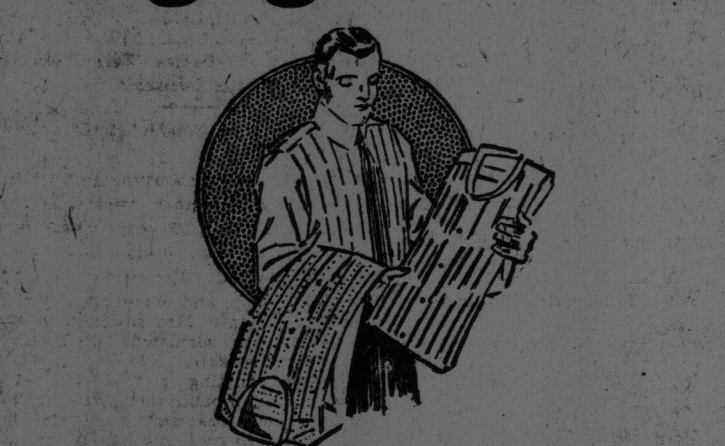

St. John Soldier Has Nine Wounds

**George Wilson Recovering, But Says
Germans Could Not Have Done
Much More to Him**

A letter received by his mother, Mrs. Charles Wilson, of 26 St. Andrew street, from her son, George, serving with the 1st Royal Montreal Regiment in the first contingent told of his having received wounds in the battle of Ypres. "I am getting along fine, now," he said, "but I had five shrapnel wounds in the left arm besides a bullet through my right leg. I was also hit below the cheek bone, and the shot passed through the roof of my mouth. I was also struck in the neck by shrapnel which worked itself out, and in addition I was struck in the left shoulder."

"I was operated on a few days ago and had the shrapnel taken out of my arm. I have been in hospital two weeks today, and expect to be about again in possibly two months, no thanks to the Germans, for they couldn't have done much more to me without putting me under completely."
