

STRICKEN SERBIA

Gallant Little Ally Passing Through Time of Horror

Medical and Surgical Supplies Are Wanted With All Haste—Notes of Work of the Red Cross

Toronto, June 10.—All the information which is filtering through from Serbia shows how terrible are the horrors through which that gallant little ally is passing.

There is an urgent need for money in order that medical and surgical supplies may be sent with all possible haste.

Donations in money may be sent to Sir Edward Boyle, Bart., Treasurer, Serbian Relief Fund, 83 Queen's Gate, London, S. W. England.

Red Cross Notes. The following official announcement has been issued by the Canadian Red Cross Society:

The Canadian Red Cross Commission cables under date, May 18, stating that the Red Cross Society must refuse to accept shipments of goods designated for any special hospitals or officers, as he is unable to guarantee delivery under present war conditions.

The public is assured, however, that every Canadian officer commanding a medical unit in connection with the Canadian troops has been requested to draw upon the general stock of Red Cross goods for the use of his hospital or ambulance.

The Canadian Red Cross Society now has depots in England and two or more places in France from which goods are distributed by electric motor lorries.

Such supplies as socks, flannel, day shirts, cotton surgical shirts, sheets, 60 by 90 pillow slips to fit pillows of 28 by 11, about nine inches longer than the pillow, and surgical dressings are needed in unlimited quantities and will be gladly received by all local branches of the Canadian Red Cross Society or at the head office, 77 King street, east, Toronto.

Noel Marshall, chairman of the executive of the Canadian Red Cross Society, has received a letter from the property committee, Vancouver branch of the society, stating that the Tag Day collection on April 18 realized \$12,000.

One of the most active branches of the Red Cross Society in Canada is the Vancouver branch, which shipped during the month of April no less than 10,001 supplies to the men at the front.

During the month of May to date 1,189 cases of supplies and three motor ambulances have been shipped by the Canadian Red Cross Society from Montreal and 115 cases have been sent from Halifax.

ALL INFANTRY OF SECOND CONTINGENT NOW IN FRANCE

Ottawa, June 11.—The infantry regiments of the second Canadian overseas division are now all in France, according to an announcement of Major General Hughes tonight.

The division is under the command of Major General Sam Steele, of Winnipeg. It is thought that these troops will be some little time at the base before being moved forward to the firing line.

The division consists of the 4th, 5th and 6th infantry brigades, respectively, under the command of Brigadier-General Houlston; army service corps, and various other units which go to make up a complete division.

ACQUITTAL OF MISS MORRISON IN BANGOR

As stated in The Times on Thursday, Miss Catherine A. Morrison, well known in this province and her native province of Nova Scotia

There has been a little boy, the picture of health and contentment, perhaps three or four years old, much in evidence in the court room during the past two days, and he is one of the children rescued by Miss Morrison.

Miss Morrison testified that her home is in Loch Lomond, N. S., but she has resided in Bangor, in 1887 she was in Denver, Colo., doing rescue work among the fallen girls. She did the same sort of work in the training camps for three years.

She came to Bangor in the fall of 1901. She claimed to have started the Good Samaritan home in this city on a quarter. She was with the work for a year when she was obliged to give up on account of ill health.

She started the magazine, The Earnest Worker in 1908. She raised \$1,018 for a home for girls in Auburn making a trip through the lumber camps.

In 1910 she came to Bangor and became interested in children's work. It cost about \$800 to get out the paper. The money she got she used for clothing, feeding and rescuing children.

She denied that she had ever had any source that she had not used for children since starting the work.

She denied that she had ever had any interest to defraud the government when she organized the Earnest Worker society.

Robert C. Gill of Bangor testified that he had let a suite of rooms to the Earnest Worker and had seen them bring great many children there. He told of the condition that some of them were in

and told they were clothed and homes found for them.

On cross-examination he said that part of the suite of rooms was sometimes occupied by Miss Morrison and Mrs. Blood when they were in town. His daughter Mrs. Emma Blood testified that she was secretary for a time for the organization. She had seen the notice of the first meeting of directors which included the men who resigned, prepared for mailing.

She told of a home for the children at 27 First street, where the society had 80 children. They were kept there until homes were found for them.




