WING GOVERNMENT RESIGNS

GOVERNOR GENERAL IS ADVISED TO DISSOLVE COMMONS BY PREMIER

OTTAWA, June 28.—Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, Premier of Canada, this afternoon announced the resignation of his government. Premier King added that he had advised the Governor-General to dissolve parliament and that His Excellency had declined to grant dissolution.

12 MISSING MEN REACH LAHAVE THIS MORNING

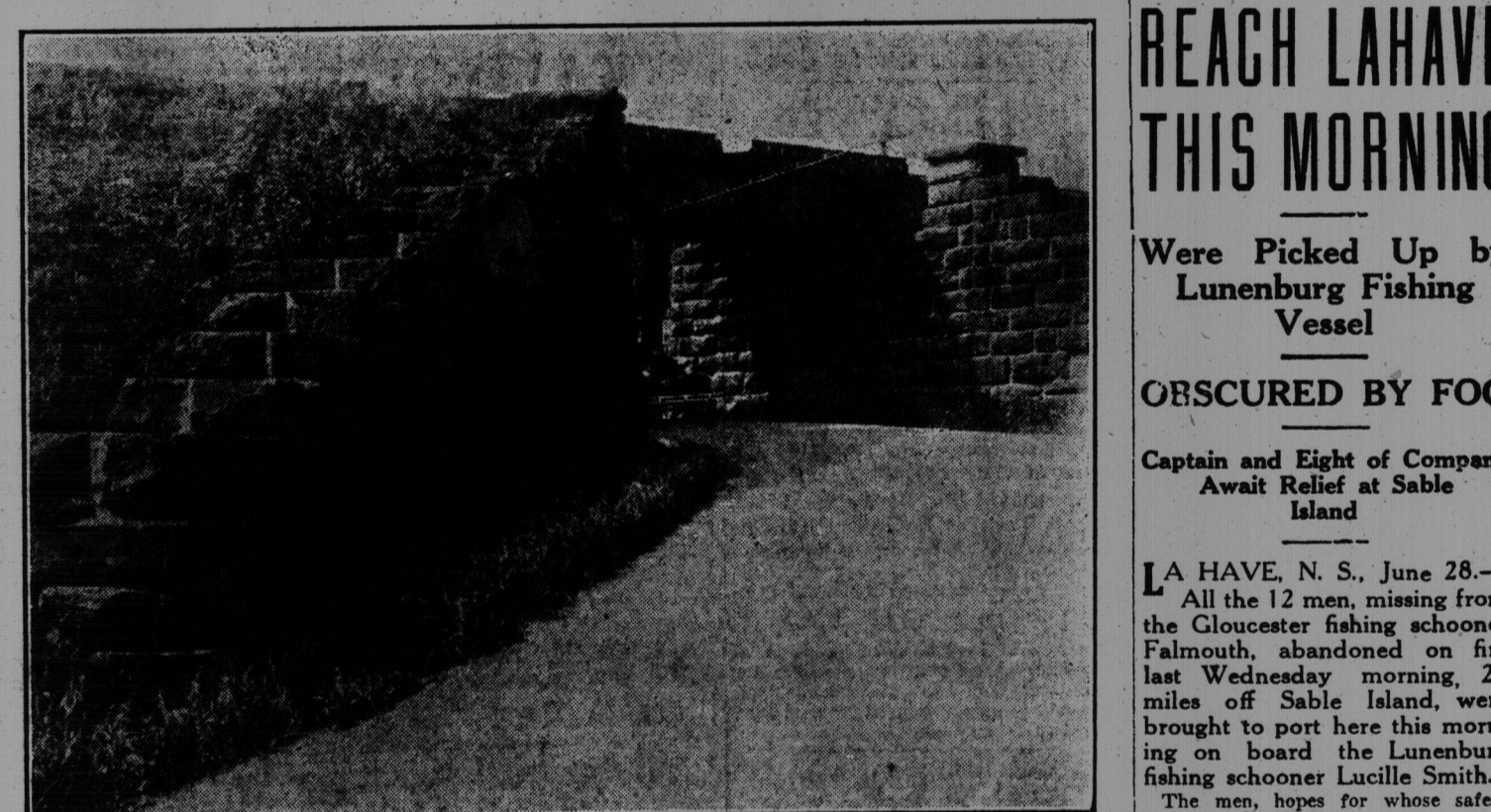
GEORGE STYRAN IS DEAD AT CAPITAL

THE photo above is that of the viaduct at Fair Vale, considered by motorists as one of the greatest menaces to safety in the province. It shows the steep gradient to be negotiated before entering the narrow viaduct on the outward journey to Gondola Point, and the hazard when cars meet at this spot.

Victoria Carpenters To Get \$7 A Day

VICTORIA, B. C., June 28.—In a compromise effected Saturday striking Victoria carpenters, agreed to return to work immediately at an increase of 50 cents a day. On September 1, 1926, the carpenters will receive \$7 a day, or an increase of \$1 over the former rates in force when the men downed tools on June 1.

Manchurians To Aid Striking Mine Workers

HARBIN, Manchuria, June 28.—Labor leader here are collecting \$20,000 to be sent to England to aid striking British miners. Members of professional unions are required to subscribe one per cent of their monthly wages to make up the \$20,000 quota.

BAN MALE APPLAUSE Women's Strike Heads Smash Machinery

LONDON, June 28.—The Daily Mail's Shanghai correspondent reported that leaders of 14,000 striking women employes in silk reeling establishments, smashed the machinery of 10 factories, routed police attempting to quell the disorders, wrecked the offices of the trades unions and assaulted union officials.
