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RESIGNATION OF CABINET IS EXPECTED

KING LIKELY TO STEP OUT, NINE OF MINISTERS BEATEN

His Remaining In Office Would Necessitate Many By-elections—Another General Vote Expected Within Year—Conservatives Now Have 118

OTTAWA, Oct. 30—Premier King definitely denied this afternoon rumors that he had decided to place his resignation in the hands of the Governor-General.

"When all the returns are in, I intend to discuss the situation with the Governor-General and I shall then make a statement of my intentions," he said.

Beyond that the premier declined to go further.

OTTAWA, Ont., Oct. 30—Resignation of the King government is regarded in political circles as the most probable outcome of yesterday's general elections.

Of this there is as yet no official indication. Leaders of both Liberal and Conservative parties are awaiting final returns before making official pronouncements.

There will no doubt be cabinet meetings before the Premier decides on his course. But the fact that he and no less than eight of his cabinet ministers were defeated gives rise to the feeling that he will decide not to attempt to continue in office.

Should he retain the premiership, a series of by-elections would be necessary to repair the damage of his cabinet. Three of the ministers defeated yesterday—Hons. Vincent Massey, Herbert Marler and J. E. Sinclair held no portfolio.

But the remainder, not counting the Premier who is also head of the Department of External Affairs, held between them the portfolio of Immigration, Secretary of State, Labor and Railways. Appointees to these portfolios, including the Premier himself, would all need to be either elected or re-elected.

And what of the Premier's successor, should Mr. King place his resignation in the hands of the Governor-General? As head of the largest group in the House, Mr. Meighen would not doubt be invited to form an administration.

But it is questioned if he would accept, except on the understanding of another general election to clear the air.

ANOTHER CONTEST LIKELY On all hands, in fact expectation is that Canada's new parliament will be short lived. Gossip is that it will likely meet for one session, vote supplies necessary to carry on the administration of the country's affairs, pass essential legislation and that another general election will be on the cards for next year.

Returns received up to 1:30 p.m. give the Conservative following as 118, or five short of the 123 necessary for a clear majority in the next year. There are still 12 seats to hear from.

QUEBEC RESULTS. MONTREAL, Oct. 30—At least 58 of the members comprising the Liberal bloc in Canada's fifteenth parliament will come from Quebec province. With returns incomplete from all except the most centralized ridings in the province, it appeared at an early hour this morning that 45 of the 65 seats in Quebec had returned supporters of Premier Maclean King.

Of the remainder, four constituencies will be represented by Conservatives and two by Independents. The result in Pontiac remains in doubt.

The two Independents who received the endorsement of the voters are Henri Bourassa, former Nationalist, and now simply Independent-Liberal in Chleoutin over a straight Liberal and a straight Conservative. Two Labor members and two Liberal Protectionists were defeated. A dozen Independent Liberals went down to defeat, as did one Farmer and several straight Independents.

PONTIAC RESULTS. CAMPBELL'S RIVER, Que., Oct. 30—Although only 62 polls out of 140 in Pontiac county have been heard from so far, E. Davies, returning officer for Pontiac county, stated this morning that the election of Frank S. Cahill, Liberal member of the last House, was assured, and that it was but a question of how large his majority would be.

The polls reported so far give Mr. Cahill a majority of 1,111 over Lucien Ladouceur, Conservative. E. Lepage, Independent Liberal, has polled a little more than 500 votes, and will lose his deposit.

ONTARIO REVERSE. TORONTO, Oct. 30—Complete returns this morning indicated the election in South West of Major F. C. Sanderson, Liberal, by a majority of 416 over his Conservative opponent, R. F. Graham. This is a reversal of the result of last night, which indicated the election of the Conservative candidate. The standing in Ontario is now Liberals 10, Conservatives 70 and Progressives 2.

CHANGES IN WEST. WINNIPEG, Man., Oct. 30—The political complexion of the Prairie representation to the Federal Parliament underwent a drastic change at the hands of the electors yesterday. When the compilation of returns were concluded, early this morning, the outstanding changes were definitely indicated.

The Liberal gains in Saskatchewan at the expense of the Progressives featured the returns from that province. In Manitoba the Conservatives gained,

like, at the expense of the Progressives, stood out. Conservative gains in Alberta were notable. In all three provinces, the outstanding feature was the defection of the voters from the ranks of the Progressive party, to the ranks of one of the two old parties.

PARTY STANDINGS. It was pretty definitely indicated that Manitoba had returned seven Conservatives, six Progressives, two Liberals, and one Independent. One seat, Provencher, remained in doubt, with a Progressive holding a precarious lead of four votes and a number of polls unreported.

Saskatchewan indicated a wholesale switch from Progressive to Liberal with Liberals elected or conceded election in 10 seats; Progressives elected in 12, in the remaining seats, Liberals had a margin in seven, and the Progressive was leading in two.

In Alberta three Conservatives, two Progressives and Liberal were elected. Liberals were leading in 3 seats, Conservatives in 1, and the Progressives in the remaining six.

Manitoba constituencies returned the results of two parties, Right Hon. Arthur Meighen securing a probable majority of 700 over Harry Leard, Progressive in Portage La Prairie. Seven seats still to be heard from are located in the old Selkirk riding joined to Portage La Prairie by redistribution, and which gave Liberal majorities at the last election. Mr. Meighen's majority is not expected to be much below 700, however.

FORKE IS ELECTED. Robert Forke, Progressive leader, won a comparatively easy victory in Brandon, over D. W. Deauber, Conservative, final returns giving him more than 1,000 majority.

Labor won in North Winnipeg and North Centre, Winnipeg, while the Liberal candidate in St. Boniface is a Law seat.

Labor increased its representation from the province. Alderman A. A. Heaps, long prominent in local labor circles, joined with J. S. Woodworth, Labor leader, who was re-elected. Saskatchewan which at dissolution was almost solidly Progressive, witnessed the greatest inroads into the strength of that party. Hon. W. R. Motherwell, Minister of Agriculture, led the poll from the first in the constituency of Melville, and was never headed.

Almost complete returns indicated that his majority would be over 1,000. Mr. Motherwell represented Regina in the last House, and his successor is a Liberal standard bearer in that seat. N. Darke came home a winner. Melville is a new constituency.

LIBERAL IN PROVENCHER. WINNIPEG, Man., Oct. 30—The election of E. Comeault, Liberal, in the hitherto doubtful constituency of Provencher, was conceded late this morning. He has a majority of about 100 over his Progressive opponent, A. L. Beaulieu.

BRIAND SEES LEAGUE

MARITIMES ELECTED 23 CONSERVATIVES

Defeat of Hon. J. E. Sinclair in P. E. I. Leaves Liberals With Six Seats—Three Candidates Expected to Lose Their Deposits.

HALIFAX, N. S., Oct. 30—Beyond confirming the defeat of Hon. John E. Sinclair of Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island's representative in the King government, returns received this morning from outlying booths in the Maritime Provinces made no change in the stand of the parties as announced last night.

The twenty-nine members in the next Parliament of Canada from the Maritime Provinces will include twenty-three Conservatives and six Liberals.

The two Independent candidates that ran in the Maritimes, J. B. McLachlan, Labor, in Cape Breton South, and Mrs. Minnie B. Adney, in Victoria-Charleton, were not serious factors in the vote-getting, the former being defeated by 5,986 votes and the latter receiving less than 100 votes.

TWO MINISTERS GONE. Of the three ministerial candidates, one in each province, Hon. W. E. Foster, Saint John-Albert, Secretary of State; Hon. E. M. Macdonald, Antigonish-Guyaboro, Minister of National Defence, and Hon. J. E. Sinclair, Queens, minister without portfolio, Hon. Mr. Macdonald was the sole survivor. Hon. Mr. Sinclair, according to final returns received this morning, lost his constituency by 11 votes, his defeat being one of the narrowest in the three provinces.

THREE LOSE DEPOSITS. While returns were this morning still incomplete, it looked as if three candidates in the Maritime Provinces would lose their deposits, C. R. Hawkins, Liberal, York-Sunbury; J. B. McLachlan, Labor, Cape Breton South, and Mrs. Adney, Victoria-Charleton, all having failed to secure half the number of votes of the victorious candidates in their respective constituencies.
