Fatal Fire's Origin Remains Mystery

WOODSTOCK, Nov. 12.—At the inquiry here tonight before Coroner John Lindsay into the cause of the death of Miss Beulah Fox, who was missed after the fire of the morning of Sept. 1, in King street here, in which the premises in which she was a resident were completely destroyed, the jury, of which A. E. Jones was foreman, rendered the verdict that Beulah Fox was burned to death when the building in which she was sleeping was destroyed.

Deer Charges Auto; Occupants Hurt

LONDON, Nov. 12.—A deer, dashing out of Epping Forest, was knocked down by a car driven by Dr. J. H. Nichol, of Chingford, Essex.

It scrambled to its feet again and, minus an antler, darted back into the forest, apparently unhurt.

The car, however, was badly damaged, Dr. Nichol had his nose broken and a shoulder and thigh injured. His three passengers were also hurt.

TENNIS STAR DEAD.

NEW YORK, Nov. 12.—Robert D. Wrenn, famous tennis player and all-round athlete, is dead. United States national champion for four years, a second baseman and a quarter back at Harvard, a good hockey player and first-class golfer, a Roosevelt Rough Rider during the Spanish War, a major in the air service during the world war, he died last evening in his apartment here of Bright's disease. He was 63 years old.
