

RUSSIAN LETTER RAISES STORM IN ENGLAND TODAY

Govt. Sends a Sharp Letter to Soviet Ambassador in London.

WHAT LETTER SAYS

It is Aimed at Overthrow of Existing Institutions in Great Britain.

London, Oct. 24.—The British Government is again in conflict with the Russian Soviet government on the question of propaganda, according to correspondence issued by the Foreign Office tonight for publication in tomorrow's newspapers. In a letter dated today, signed "in the absence of the Secretary of State" by one of the permanent officials of the Foreign Office, T. Gregory, and addressed to Christian Rakovsky, the Russian Ambassador in London, attention is drawn to an accompanying copy of a letter received by the Central Committee of the British Communist party from Mr. Zinoviev, President of the Committee of the Communist Internationale, dated on Aug. 15.

"This letter," says the communication of Mr. Gregory, "contains instructions to British subjects to work for the violent overthrow of existing institutions in this country and for the subversion of His Majesty's armed forces as a means to that end. It is my duty to inform you that His Majesty's government cannot allow this propaganda and must regard it as direct interference from the outside in British domestic affairs."

Appeal to Communists.

Accompanying the letter of Mr. Gregory is a copy of M. Zinoviev's letter, which is endorsed "Very secret." This communication, which contains more than 1,000 words, urges British Communists to continue to apply pressure to insure that the Bourgeoisie campaign to prevent ratification of the recently concluded Anglo-Russian treaty shall not succeed and to exercise similar pressure in British Government and Parliamentary circles in favor of ratification of the treaty.

The Zinoviev letter represents the Government of Premier MacDonald as having been compelled by the extremists of the Labor party to conclude the treaty and advocates "a campaign of disclosure of the foreign policy of MacDonald, which Zinoviev says represents 'an inferior copy of the policy of the Curzon government.'"

Wats Military Sector.

He declared that armed warfare must be preceded by a struggle against the inclinations to compromise, which are declared to be imbedded in a majority of the British workmen and against the ideas of evolution and the peaceful extermination of capitalism.

The letter complains that agitation and propaganda work in the British army and navy are weak, and suggests the desirability of having "cells" in every unit to rectify this weakness. It also suggested that in the event of danger of war these "cells" could, with the aid of transport workers, paralyze all military preparations and make a start towards turning an imperialist war into a class war.

Zinoviev suggests also that the forming of a military section of the British Communist party and attracting to it talented military specialists who, for one reason or another, have left the military service and hold Socialist views.

OSMAN DIGNA IS IN NEWS AGAIN

Once Terror of Sudan, Has Been in Prison Twenty-two Years.

There is going the rounds of the press a London story stating that Osman Digna has just been released after 22 years of solitary confinement in a cell at Wady Halfa and is now on a pilgrimage to Mecca, though nearly 100 years old.

For nearly a quarter of a century he has been kept in a cell by himself, guarded day and night by Egyptian soldiers and given occasional exercise in a compound surrounded by high mud walls.

It is added that the prisoner had been forgotten by the foreign office until the question was raised at the last session of Parliament. His release was the result of efforts on his behalf in England.

When Rudyard Kipling was writing his "Barrack Room Ballads," Fussy Wussy was one of Great Britain's most troublesome problems, and Fussy's leader, Osman Digna, emir and principal lieutenant of the Mahdi, was one of the main reasons why the Sudan had become a death trap for thousands of British soldiers and a chal-

lenge to British military governmental prestige.

Osman Digna was a formidable foe for many years. He was often officially reported dead, only to hob up again in some inconvenient place from which he must be dislodged with difficulty and losses.

Once Kitchener almost captured him, being himself wounded in the fight.

EDMUNDSTON MAY HAVE GOLD STORAGE

Matter Discussed With Deputy Minister—Province Industry News.

Edmundston, Oct. 23.—Proposals for the erection of a gold storage plant were discussed here on Thursday evening at a meeting of farmers and others interested in the erection of a gold storage plant with Dr. J. H. Grisdale, Deputy Minister of Agriculture, Ottawa.

The erection of such a plant would, if undertaken, be carried out on a co-operative basis with the Federal Department of Agriculture, the latter assisting to a certain extent in the financial arrangements necessary. Dr. Grisdale was assured that further steps would be taken.

was put through the new crosscutting plant which has been constructed here by the Canada Crosscutting Company on Thursday in the presence of a large number of C. N. R. officials and engineers as well as many of the engineering representatives of the province. This plant is the first of its kind in general service until the final completion of the entire plant.

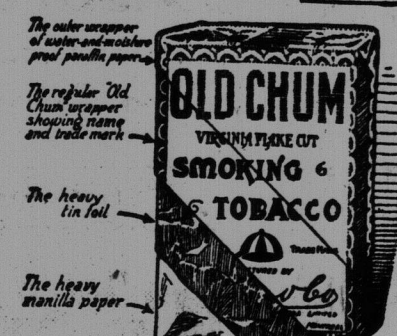
Fredericton, N. B., Oct. 23.—The new hardwood mill to be operated by John A. Morrison, of this city, will be erected at a site on the Transcontinental Division of the Canadian National Railways at Mavis within a few hundred yards of that of the Mavis Timber Company. It is understood that 20,000 hardwood railway ties for the C. N. R. are included in the contracts for the new operations as well as 25,000 softwood ties.

Extensive hardwood operations are expected the coming winter in north-eastern district of York county and in Carleton county, including the Fleming-Gibson Company, who this season cut six million feet of hardwood as well as four million feet of spruce.

MEDAL FOR C. N. R. MAN.

William Albert Warman on Thursday received a long service medal in recognition of his faithful work for the railway in Moncton, which service he entered in November, 1883, as a brakeman. In 1904 he was promoted to conductor and he remained in that position until he retired on the Provident Fund in January, 1924. Mr. Warman is a native of Welsford, N. B. He resided, however, practically all of his life in Moncton.

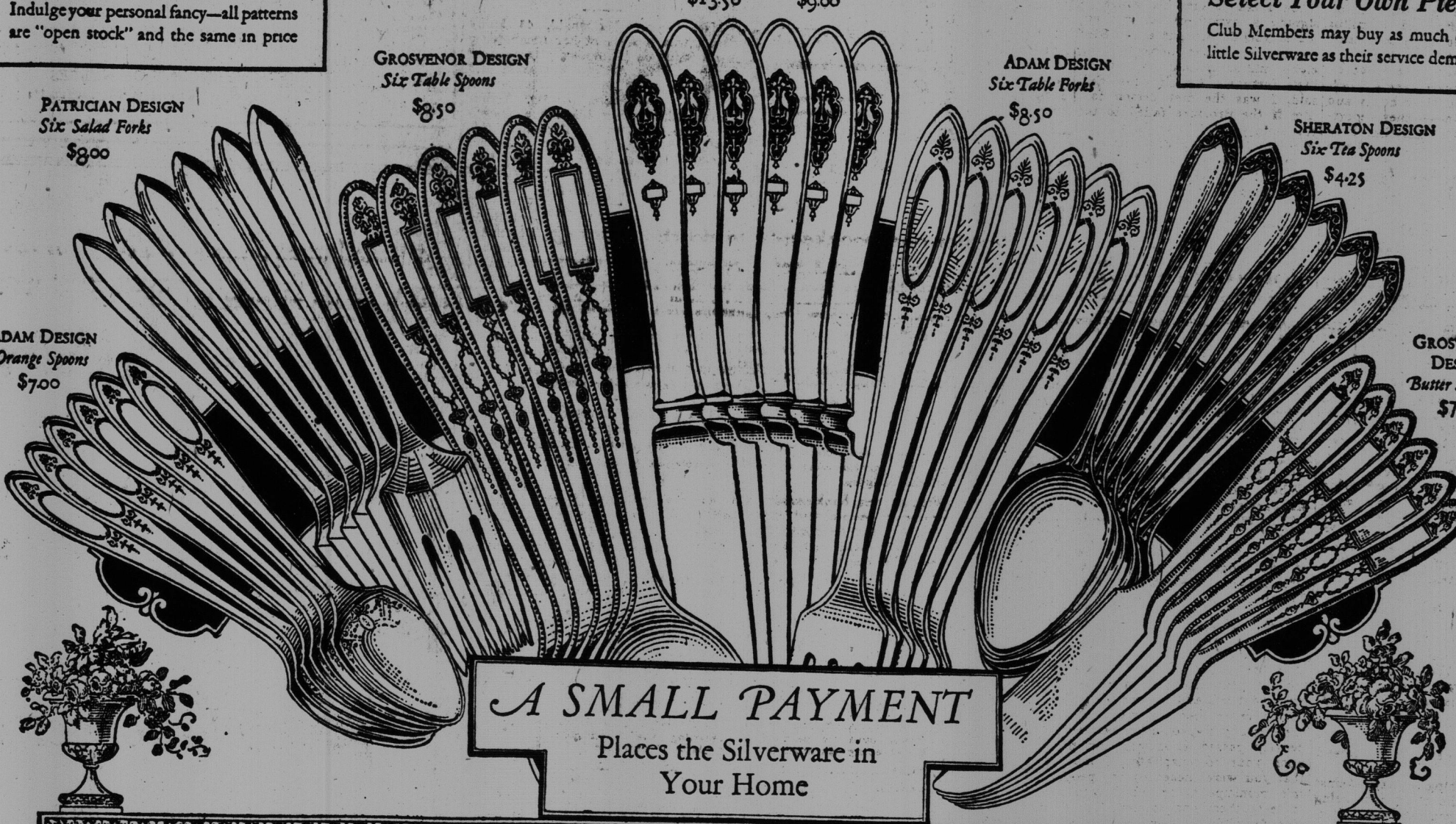

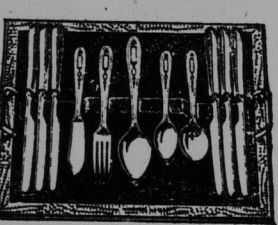
