

RAIL HEAD SCORES PUBLIC OWNERSHIP OF ELECTRIC LINES

C. D. Emmons Cites Experiences of Detroit in Municipal Control.

Atlantic City, Oct. 11.—(By A. P.)—Public ownership was scored as "socialistic and in nine cases out of ten saturated with politics and inefficiency," by C. D. Emmons, of Baltimore, president of the American Electric Railway Association, addressing that organization in convention here several thousand electric railway men from all parts of the world were present.

The problem before all who would preserve a prosperous, sane nation is to demonstrate to the unthinking the fallacy of demagogues who advance the socialistic cause and the ruin that lies in adoption of their nostrums," Mr. Emmons declared.

The Detroit municipal street railway situation was cited by Mr. Emmons as an example of the inability of municipal control advocates to keep their promises. There, he said, city officials proclaimed, at the end of a year's municipal operation, that they had made a "profit of \$1,000,000 under a five-cent fare" only to be compelled to admit, a few weeks later, that the so-called "profit" was gone and that a fare raise and a new bond issue would be necessary to keep the lines running.

"The people of Detroit were promised the five-cent fare, extended service, the finest equipment and payment for the property out of earnings, and no more bond issues by municipal control advocates," he said.

"Such promises are easily made, but not easy to live up to. Were it possible for a municipality to employ

Having done that, the duty of the public and buy materials at lower prices than privately owned companies must pay, demagogic promises might be kept. But one cannot escape facts, and the fact in the case of Detroit is that when it became necessary to increase the wages of employees of the Department of Street Railway, those in charge of the railways could turn only to the car riders for the additional money, and they increased the fare to six cents, plus one cent for a transfer. They did right, but they did nothing different from what every privately owned property has had to do in similar circumstances.

"In this connection I think it is timely and proper to state again the attitude of the Association toward public ownership. That we are opposed to it is common knowledge, but why we are opposed to it may not be understood by the public. Our opposition is not because we fear the loss of our property—the laws of this country protect all enterprises from confiscation without payment of the full value of the property taken. Our opposition is not due to fear of loss of profits, for some of the largest railways in the country have made no profits for several years.

"Why, then, are we and all other business organizations, opposed to public ownership? Because it is foreign to and in conflict with the fundamental principles of the American government. It is, in nine instances out of ten, wasteful, saturated with politics and inefficiency, and because, once it is established as a principle, it means the end of the representative form of government and the beginning of socialistic government.

"The public in most communities has come to understand that the street railway companies are making every effort to provide adequate service, and that they cannot do this unless a fair deal is accorded them by the people.

"We have no quarrel with the private automobile owner and we have no quarrel with the bus except when the bus enters territory that is rightfully that of the electric railway. I say rightfully because the states and municipalities, in giving the companies the right to do business in the streets, retain to themselves the power to regulate service and control rates of fare.

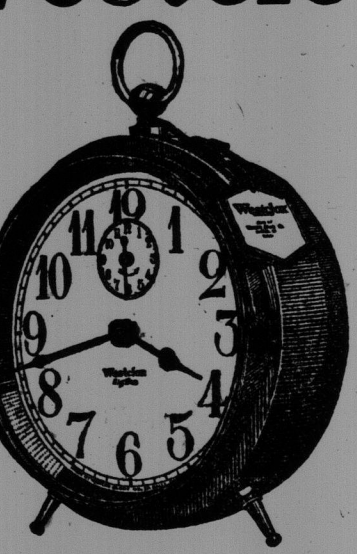

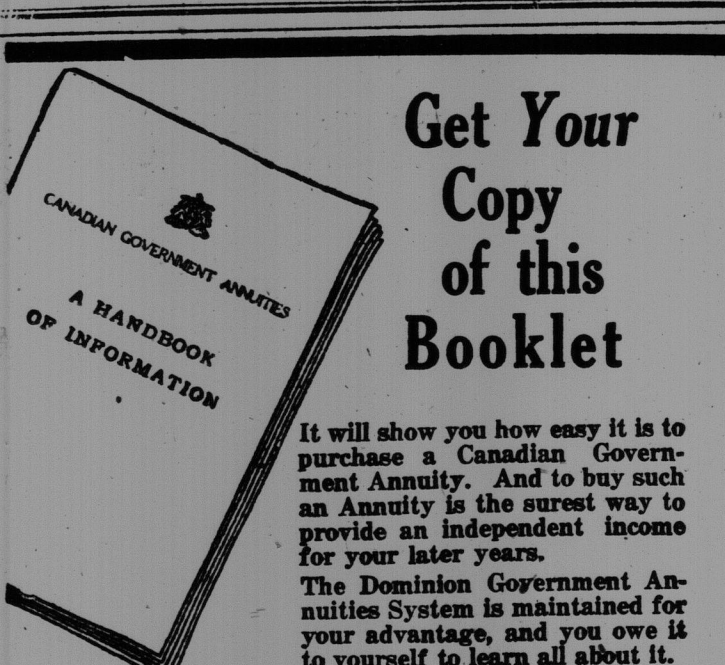
