
CATHOLIC WOMEN OPEN SEASON

First Meeting of C. W. L. Held Yesterday-Reports of Winnipeg Gathering.

More than 200 attended the opening meeting of the Catholic Women's League for this season which was held last evening in the Knights of Columbus hall. During the course of the evening, Mrs. Richard O'Brien told of the aims and ideals of the league which included the union of all Catholic women of the dominion for the purpose of promoting religious, intellectual, social and patriotic work and the handling of problems of the Canadianization of foreign groups of the Catholic faith.

Mrs. 7tichara C'Brien, as president, relecomed the members and spoke appreciatively of the generosity of the Knights of Columbus in giving the league the use of the council hall for one night each month. Referring to the annual meeting of the national branch in Winnipeg, which she had attended, she said the diocesan president, Mrs. D. P. Chisholm, would give her resport later. Lloyd George Fights With

His Back to the Wall

Lloyd George is down but not out, seems to be the verdict of neutral observers on the resignation of Britain's Premier, whose Coalition Government has been in power through the long stormy years since the war got under way. The London Outlook blames his decline on his handling of the Near East problem, saying: "There comes an hour in the career of many successful men when some fatal flaw of character, hidden in the years of struggle, and perhaps hardly suspected in the day of prosperity, exposes itself suddenly before the world at a moment of sudden crisis. 

To the People of New Brunswick: My attention has been called by the Provincial Great War Veterans' Association to the fact that the association will on Armistice Day of this year through its branches and other patricic bodies sell artificial poppies, and that the proceeds will be used to alleviate distress among the returned soldiers during the winter. I am informed by the association that these poppies are made in Canada, from Canadian material, by people providing home industry for disabled men and dependents. It seems to me a happy thought that Armistice Day should be celebrated in this most laudable and patriotic manner, and it gives me great pleasure to make an appeal to you, the people of New Brunswick, to give to the Great War Veterans' Association your earnest and enthusiastic assistance in their undertaking.
