BIG DAY AT WASHINGTON

Naval and Far Eastern Questions—Sir Robert Borden Complimented.

(Canadian Press) Washington, Jan. 6.—The settlement of the intricate and difficult questions involved in China's remand for wider involvement in the Pacific, as revealed in an official communication issued last night, is one of the topics of chief interest in conference circles today.

Another subject dealt with was the extravagant amount of money being expended by the Chinese government upon military establishments and on military operations since the overthrow of the dynasty. Public opinion in China is strongly opposed to the exercise of such powers by these military dictators and to the wasteful expenditures above alluded to.
