### LOCAL NEWS

Duck shooting and the shooting for  
brant, geese, wild fowl and large game  
commences on September 15 in New  
Brunswick and west on September 1.  
Changes in the date on which shooting  
commences have been made of recent  
years and, in consequence, some doubt  
has arisen in the minds of sportsmen as  
to which is the legal date.

The first of two storage tanks for the  
fuel station at East St. John has arrived  
and will be conveyed to its final destination  
as soon as the bridge over the  
Marsh creek has been suitably  
strengthened. The capacity of the  
tank is 55,000 barrels, and it will be the  
largest in the maritime provinces. Plans  
are maturing for the establishment of an  
oil-refining plant at East St. John.

The W. C. T. U. held a meeting  
yesterday afternoon, with Mrs. David Hip-  
well, the president, in the chair. The  
secretary read a letter from Chief In-  
spector J. B. Hawthorne, in which he  
expressed regret that he was unable to  
attend the meeting. Reports were re-  
ceived from those visiting hospitals and  
stricken families, and plans for the  
coming exhibition were discussed.

At a meeting of the local branch of  
the Navy League of Canada, held in the  
board of trade rooms yesterday, R. E.  
Armstrong presided. The purpose of the  
meeting was to discuss the appointment of  
Commander Lewis as commissioner for the  
maritime provinces. The purpose of his  
work to be the arousing of interest in

dation will be provided for the purpose of  
welcoming the officers and men of the  
Camarilla, which arrived in port today.

**SMALL PERCENTAGE  
OF MILK CLEAN**  
Matter Taken Up at Meeting  
of Board of Health Yesterday.

The question of pure milk was dis-  
cussed at length yesterday afternoon at a  
meeting of the health board. Dr. William  
Warwick, sub-district health officer, was  
authoritative in his statement that one  
hundred samples of milk coming into  
St. John were absolutely clean. The  
percentages of the milk samples were as  
follows: Very dirty, eleven per cent;  
dirty, thirty-nine per cent; fairly  
clean, thirty-nine per cent; clean, five  
per cent. Besides the lay members of  
the board were present Hon. Geo. H. Murray,  
Minister of Health, Dr. G. G. Melvin, provincial health  
officer; Dr. H. L. Abramson, provincial  
bacteriologist; Dr. William Warwick, sub-  
district health officer; and Dr. Fred Johnston,  
dairy and food inspector. Discussion was very  
lively, and the policy of the board was  
expressed by John Kelly, the chairman,  
George Blake, president, Dr. Robert  
said he understood that some of the  
milk used in St. John was seventy-two  
hours old and this was a condition  
which should not be tolerated here. A  
milk train was suggested as a remedy  
and it was the consensus of opinion that  
city should be brought about eventually.  
Dr. Melvin summarized the milk situa-  
tion under four points: cleanliness,  
freshness, disease-producing germs and  
adulteration. Dr. Warwick referred to  
the fact that the milk train had been  
in handling their milk product. Dr.  
Abramson said the board was fretting  
out all such cattle and ordering their  
inspection. He strongly urged pasteuriza-  
tion. It was said that pure milk was  
more to be desired than the pasteurized  
product as it was thought that the  
milk lost some of its intrinsic  
value through pasteurization. Mr. Huggard  
of the Milk Producers' Association was  
sent from sending milk to the city because  
of its unhealthful condition would be  
reinstated but would be watched carefully  
by officials of the board. A resolution  
reinstating them was passed.

**KING PETER OF  
SERBIA DEAD**  
King Peter of Serbia, who has been ill  
for a long time, died at Belgrade yester-  
day. His illness was caused by con-  
gestion of the lungs and he was uncon-  
scious from last Friday till the end.  
King Peter was seventy-six years old  
and desolate his illness and wounds from  
three or more wounds, was one of the  
most courageous figures of the war.  
When Serbia rejected the Austrian de-  
mands he placed himself at the head of  
the army and remained there until the  
invaders were driven from the country.

**NEW SEAPLANE  
ALTITUDE RECORD**  
Port Washington, N. Y., Aug. 17.—A  
new altitude record for seaplanes was  
claimed yesterday when a monoplane  
flying yacht, piloted by Commander  
David MacCallister, U. S. N., and carry-  
ing three passengers, reached an altitude  
of twenty thousand feet. Freezing weather  
prevented the flyers, who were dressed  
in summer attire, from going higher.  
The old record was established here  
two years ago by Chief Briggs, who  
reached an altitude of 16,000 feet.

Different Men Than Bene-  
dict and Pius.

Rome, Aug. 17.—In September, Bene-  
dict XV. will have reigned, as Pope,  
seven years. A writer in the Epoca  
who appears to be conversant with inner  
life of the Vatican, describes his person-  
ality as that of a "spineless," so well has  
the veil of reserve instituted at his ac-  
cession, been maintained.  
The whole world felt as if it knew  
the lovable, humane, predecessor of  
Benedict, even during his life, still more  
since his death. A tradition of veneration  
surrounds the name of Pius X. like  
that of St. Francis of Assisi, "every-  
body's saint."

**MUST DRESS IN BATHHOUSE.**

New London, Conn., Aug. 17.—Bathers

when Mayor Morgan instructed Captain  
of Police Charley Pimney to detail officers  
at the seashore tomorrow and put a stop  
to the practice.

parties, unable to secure bathhouse ac-  
commodations, changing their clothing in  
their automobiles. Mayor Morgan  
says there is a sufficient number of  
bathhouses and no need for dressing  
and undressing in the automobiles.

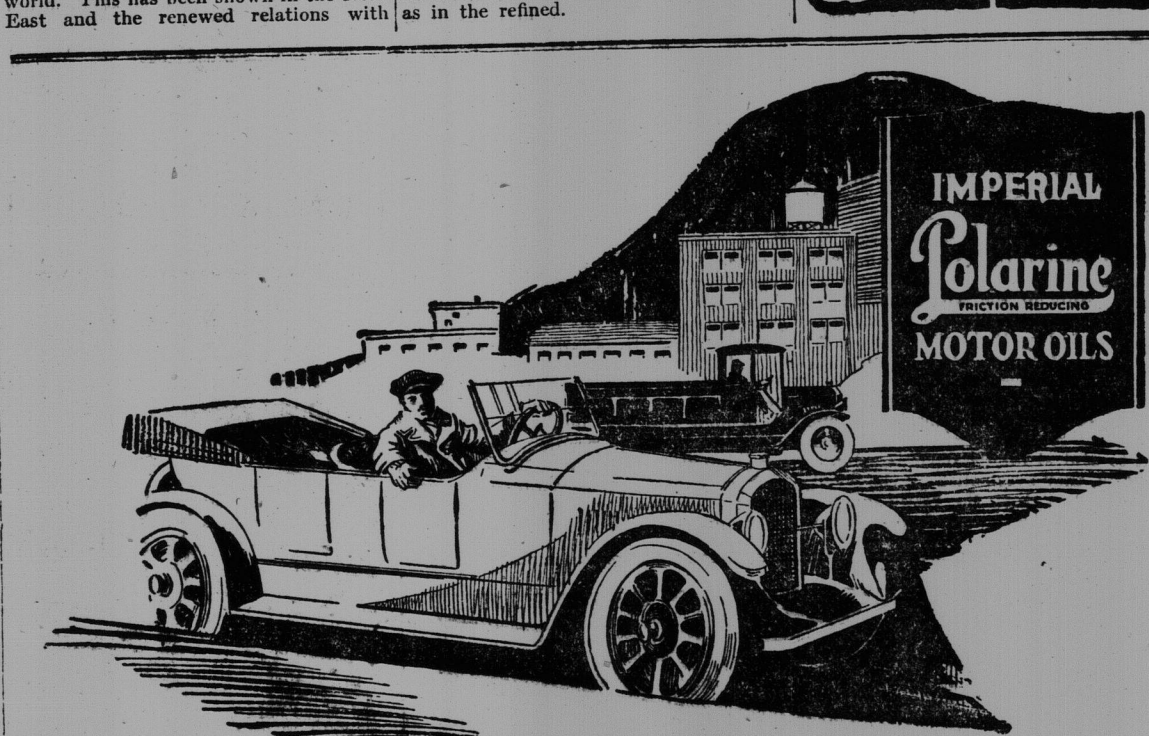
**POOR APPLE CROP  
THROUGH EUROPE**

**MINING IN QUEBEC.**  
The value of the products of the mines  
and quarries operated during 1920 in the  
province of Quebec reached a record  
figure of \$28,292,939. This is the highest  
figure yet attained and the upward trend  
of mineral production has been continu-  
ing for the last six years. As compared  
with the preceding year, when the value  
of the production was \$20,813,670, there  
was an increase of \$7,479,269, or 36.4 per  
cent.  
If we go back twenty years and take  
the value of the mineral production in  
1900, which was \$2,446,076, we observe  
that the mineral industry of the  
province has grown more than tenfold  
in that period.

**FIRMNESS IN SUGAR.**  
The advance in prices of granulated  
sugar, which was put into effect re-
