GEM THEFT OF \$13,000 IN HOTEL

Mrs. John D. Pelton's Room in The Manhattan Robbed and Bellboy is Arrested

New York, Dec. 10.—A theft of \$10,000 worth of jewels on Saturday night from the room of Mrs. John D. Pelton, in the Hotel Manhattan at Forty-second street and Madison avenue, was revealed when the Jersey City police arrested one of the bellboys. The boy, who described himself as Joseph Cafarello of 94 Beacon avenue, Jersey City, denied that he had any knowledge of the crime.

Acting upon information given them by a 12-year-old boy, who said he had overheard three men plan some burglaries, detectives from police headquarters arrested Cafarello's brother, Vincent, and three other boys on suspicion of burglary.

The police said they believed they were on the trail of a gang of several men who had a systematic organization for hotel thievery, and who had placed members in many of the big hotels as employees, so that they would be able to carry out their plans of pilfering. According to the information of the police, these men on the inside wrapped up silverware and supplies in packages and hid the bundles in garbage pails, from which they were recovered outside the building by other men.

Under instructions from deceivers of the East Fifty-first street police station, Mrs. Pelton and James D. Barrett, the manager of the Manhattan hotel, said that they would not disclose the details of the gem robbery there. They admitted, however, that some one had entered the room of Mrs. Pelton on Saturday night and removed the contents of her jewel case.

The thieves apparently entered Mrs. Pelton's suite while she was absent for a few hours.

Acting upon request of the New York police, William Lynch, a detective from the Jersey City police headquarters, went to the home of Cafarello and arrested him on the technical charge of being a fugitive from justice. He denied that he had heard about the theft until the detective told him about it.

Vincent Cafarello was arrested with his companions at Broecker and Morton streets. The others arrested with Cafarello described themselves as Tony Sabello and Hugh Cox, 367 Broecker street. With information given them by these three prisoners the detectives went to 9 Morton street and arrested Michael De Vito and Antonio Campiello on the charge of receiving stolen goods. Campiello is a driver for a carting company which has contracts for removing garbage for several large hotels. The police


