**TWO ST. JOHN MEN KILLED**  
Privates T. Bradley and J. W. Patterson Give Their Lives in the War

Miss L. Pemberton, 102 Winter street, was advised this morning that Pte. Thomas Bradley, a member of a local infantry battalion, had been killed in action on Aug. 28. Private Bradley was a native of England but was residing in St. John when he was enlisted. He enlisted with the 55th Battalion and after his arrival in England transferred to another. Private Bradley was twenty-three years old and while in St. John made his home at Mrs. Margaret Pemberton's, Winter street. He was employed in the Union Foundry & Machine Works, Ltd., in West St. John at the time of enlisting. He is survived by his father, residing in New Zealand. A brother, Private Robert, was killed in action about one year ago.

Pte. J. W. Patterson.  
That Private John Wesley Patterson of 10 Frederick street was killed in action on Sept. 8 was the sad news that his wife, Mrs. Arvilla Patterson, received this morning from Ottawa. He crossed overseas as a member of the 118th Battalion and was transferred to another infantry unit. Private Patterson was twenty-five years old and prior to joining the army was employed as a tinsmith with John Driscoll, Marsh road. He was well known and his death will be learned with regret. Besides his wife and one little boy, John D. W. Patterson, his mother, Mrs. Mary Patterson, of this city, and one sister, Mrs. Herbert Jones of Montreal. His little son was only nine months old when the soldier went away. Mr. Patterson was a man of fine character and who numbered many friends.

**Robt. K. Wills.**  
Mr. and Mrs. Robert Wills of 110 St. James street received an official notification this morning that their only son, Pte. Robert K. Wills had been admitted to No. 88 General Hospital in Boulogne on Sept. 10 suffering from a gunshot wound in the neck. Private Wills crossed overseas last December with a draft from No. 9 Siege Battery. Owing to a knowledge of civil engineering he qualified as a range finder and had been employed in that capacity when wounded. He was a student in the University of New Brunswick prior to enlisting.

Mr. and Mrs. A. G. Webb of 31 Adelaide street, received a telegram from Ottawa yesterday notifying them that their son, Pte. Eldon T. Webb, had been admitted to Fort Pitt Military Hospital in Chatham, England, on September 5, suffering from a gunshot wound in the left hand. Private Webb went overseas with a draft from the 1st Depot Battalion. That he had only been at the front for a very short time is evident from his parents' receipt of a letter from him recently dated Aug. 15, saying that he was in England and with the 13th Reserve Battalion.

**Is Improving.**  
James E. Burnett of 118 Lancaster street received a telegram this morning announcing that his son, Pte. James Samuel Burnett, who is a miller at hospital at Shorecliffe, was progressing very satisfactorily. The young man, who is twenty-four years of age, enlisted with a Montreal Battalion and was only at the front a few months before being wounded, about three weeks ago.

**Workers Report Generous Response to This Part of Call for Army Huts**

From indications early this afternoon the tag day of the local branch of the Knights of Columbus for army huts for Canadian soldiers in France will be a financial success. Members on the committee report that the response from the citizens at large has been most generous and that with very few exceptions everybody acceded most willingly to a tag. In many instances the amount received was beyond expectations. Up to 1 o'clock this afternoon no fewer than 30,000 tags had been distributed and the demand continued.

A little after 8 o'clock this morning the committee assembled at the Knights of Columbus hall in Coburg street and after procuring their boxes and basket of tags were conveyed in automobiles to their destinations at points all over the city. While some remained at street corners to canvas passersby, others made a house to house call and in this way the entire city was systematically canvassed. At noon the various groups of canvassers were relieved from duty and conveyed to the knights hall, where a light luncheon was served.

Mrs. W. F. Broderick was general supervisor. Mrs. D. P. Chisholm was in charge of the various committees looking after tag day proceedings and Dr. McDonald was in charge of the automobiles, which numbered twenty. Maher, Mrs. M. Atkinson, Mrs. Edward Hauser, Mrs. A. Legere, Miss Josephine McGuire, Miss Alice O'Regan and Miss Ellen O'Regan.

The tag day workers today were cheered in the early afternoon by a report that the Quebec government had granted \$25,000 to the army huts fund.

**TO HOLD INSTITUTE FOR BUSINESS MEN**

**Retail Merchants Association and Rotary Club Arrange For Visit by Frank Stockdale, Commercial Expert**

A called meeting of the St. John executive of the Retail Merchants Association, together with a committee from the Rotary Club, met in the Association Board room, 46 German street, this morning at 10:30 o'clock. Arrangements were practically made to secure the services of Frank Stockdale to personally conduct a Retail Merchants' Institute in St. John at the end of this month.

Those present were so interested in the movement that they arranged for a mass meeting of all business men in St. John to be held in the Board of Trade rooms this week. All the large cities in Canada have enjoyed the benefits of this institute, and the St. John merchants are to be congratulated in taking the advantage of an open week prior to the engagement already arranged by Senator Dennis for Halifax.

The mass meeting is called to complete the arrangements for this institute, and it is expected that every live merchant in St. John will be present to learn the value of this institute and to assist in completing the arrangements for it. This is a step towards a bigger and better commercial St. John.

**MUST BRING GAME OUT OF THE WOODS**

There has been some uncertainty regarding the new game regulation which is designed to prevent the waste of meat killed in the woods. In reply to an inquiry, J. B. Jones, issuer of provincial licenses, quoted the section of the New Brunswick game act bearing on the matter as follows: "All persons killing game in any place within the province shall not leave the carcass on the ground or in any of the streams or lakes, under a penalty of \$20 or one month's imprisonment."

Mr. Jones said the effect of this was that it is now illegal to leave the carcass or any part of it in the woods, in order that meat brought out of the woods may not be wasted, the regulations now permit any person to preserve game in cold storage for their own use.
