## Canadian Sends Champion To a New Mark

## SKATING CHAMPIONSHIPS

McLean Cuts Quarter Mile Figure  
and Fred. Robson Clips Sixty  
Yard Record in Speed Matches  
in Cleveland

Cleveland, Jan. 24—Two world records were established at the international indoor amateur championship skating races here last night. Robert McLean, world's amateur skating champion, set a new mark for the quarter mile, while Fred Rob-

Robertson, who had, but couldn't run like a deer on the stretches on the final lap, pulling away from the Canadian. His time for the quarter miles was 37.3 seconds, breaking his former record, established at St. Paul on last Saturday, by 2-8/100ths.

Robson broke his old record of 7 1-5 seconds for the sixty yard dash by three-fifths of a second in a match race with R. O. Brunst, of Cleveland. The summary:
