ELOQUENT ADDRESS

BY HON. G. E. FOSTER

Trafalgar Day Celebration Under Auspices of St. George's Society Well Attended

Nelson's glorious victory over the combined fleets of France and Spain at Trafalgar in 1805 was fittingly commemorated last evening by the gathering in the York theatre, under the auspices of the St. George's Society. The chief feature of the evening was the address by Hon. George E. Foster, Minister of Trade and Commerce, on "Trafalgar, and what it means to the British Empire."

Mr. Foster, always an eloquent speaker, was in splendid form, and his speech was a notable one. He briefly but brilliantly painted the picture of Europe as it was at the time of the great naval battle, held up for the admiration of his audience Nelson as the hero who saved Britain from her enemies, and made the British Empire a possibility, traced the effect of the victory upon the material destinies of the Empire, and also its effect upon the spirit of the nation. In eulogizing the hero who had done so much for Greater Britain, he laid emphasis upon the example he set and the duty which his example laid upon those who come after him to share in the work of preserving the empire, urging the obligation of the colonies, whose future was assured by Nelson's victory, to do their share in keeping up the navy which holds the empire together. Mr. Foster was given a hearty reception and some of his more eloquent periods as well as the conclusion of his speech were marked by vigorous applause.

Mrs. Grace Bonner Williams contributed in no small measure to the pleasure of the audience by her vocal solos. She has a beautiful soprano voice of bird like sweetness in the higher notes, and of rich tone in the lower register, and her rendition of a carefully selected programme proved a delightful treat. She was first heard in a group of three songs "Away on the Hills," by Landon Ronald; "Shepherd thy demeanor vary," by Thomas Brown, "A Messengery" by Frank La Forge. At the conclusion of the programme she sang Donizetti's "O Luce d'quest Anima," and in response to an encore gave "The Last Rose of Summer," from Martha D. Arnold Fox was accompanist.

Gershon S. Mayes, president of St. George's Society, presided and introduced the speaker of the evening. He also sang with great feeling "The Death of Nelson." J. Twining Hart was also heard in a recitation "Admirals All," by Henry Newbolt.

In addition to those who took part in the programme there were on the platform His Honor Lieutenant Governor Wood, His Worship Mayor Frink, B. R. Macaulay, representing St. Andrew's Society, Senator Thorne, Senator Daniel, W. M. McEwen, T. Sturdee, Rev. E. B. Hooper, Col. J. R. Armstrong, E. E. Church, George Ketchum, W. W. Church and H. S. Culver. There was a large gathering in the theatre, the audience numbering about 800, and those present indicated unmistakably their appreciation of the programme provided, and the action of the society in making possible such a celebration of the historic day.

REPORTS OF WORK

IN FOREIGN FIELDS

istration. The committee has aided in settling pastors. One minister has surrendered his ordination papers.

The committee on standards of ordination submitted a valuable report advising the establishment of a permanent committee having the supervision of ordinations. This important recommendation called forth warm approval and earnest questioning.

India Missions.

Rev. J. G. Brown, D. D., secretary of the Canadian Foreign Baptist Mission Board, submitted the report for the year. This historic report stated that the missionaries in India have formed the Canadian Baptist mission conference in India. It reports a bountiful harvest, there being 1,155 baptisms, the largest in the history of the mission. The task of the mission is the evangelization of 4,000,000 in India. There is at present a Christian community of 9,000, of whom 600 are workers.

The summary of the needs to undertake this work follows: Eight bungalows for families, \$28,000; thirteen ladies' bungalows, \$40,000; nine station chapels, \$5,000; high school at Vinsagapatam with equipment, \$18,000; hotels and dormitories, \$6,000; total, \$120,000; annual expenses 85 families, salaries, \$42,000; seventy single ladies, \$42,000; traveling on foot, \$14,000; traveling on field, \$12,000; repairs and taxes, \$4,000; higher educational work, \$25,000; Indian male workers, \$200,000; Bible women, \$20,000; total, \$865,000; deduct for Indian receipts, \$100,000; balance to be supplied from abroad, \$295,000.

The income of the board was \$180,467, of which \$80,870 came from the maritime provinces. Appeals for aid have come from Bulgaria and from Chile, neither of which could be responded to yet.

Rev. Archibald Gordon and wife are the new outgoing missionaries this year. Nine missionaries are on furlough. Rev. Rufus Sanford, D. D., and Mrs. Churchill have both completed forty years of service in India.

The offices of the board are in the new Baptist church house, 228 Church street, Toronto.

The mission has in India 64 churches with 6,288 members. A great educational work is carried on in India. There are 218 village schools having 5,000 pupils. There are ten boarding schools with 611 pupils. There are three high schools and a theological seminary.

The civil marriage law in Bolivia has done something to rectify matrimonial irregularities. Religious teaching in the public schools of Bolivia has been established. There are three mission stations in Bolivia, having seven workers.

The treasurer's report showed a total income of \$814,687, made up as follows: Western section, \$8,279; central section, \$81,817; eastern section, \$84,870; the outlay was \$159,245, leaving a deficit of \$28,775.
