EVIDENCE IN THE LOGGIE CASE IN COURT AT CHATHAM

Chatham, N. B., May 18—(Special)—The Fisher case before the exchequer court was finished yesterday afternoon and the A. & R. Loggie case was taken up. This is the most important before the court. The property that the railway takes from the defendant includes a navigation wharf. It was bought about ten years ago by the defendants for \$7,000 but the case that they are making before the court is that to place the crib work that lies there and the buildings that were on the property would cost \$125,000 and they are demanding that the government should pay them this sum. There are five lawyers. Recorder Baxter and Dr. W. B. Wallace of St. John and Robert Murray, K. C., of Chatham, for the defendants and T. W. Butler, K. C., and R. A. Lawlor, K. C., for the crown. Gilbert G. Murdoch of St. John, engineer, on the stand estimated the timber structure to be worth \$113,616. D. C. Clark of St. John, wharf builder, said he valued the timber and stone ballast at \$106,700 and earth filling \$15,813.

John McDonald of Chatham, builder, said the buildings were worth \$113,983.39. Whitman Brewer, of St. Mary's said the reconstruction of the wharf would cost \$104,672 and that the value, after allowing for all depreciation was \$83,920. To Judge Audette he said the property if put on the market would have a value of \$100,000 but when asked if he would give such an amount for it if it were on sale he said he would hardly give this amount though he maintained that it was worth this.
