EVIDENCE IN THE LOGGIE CASE IN COURT AT CHATHAM

Chatham, N. B., May 18—(Special)—The evidence in the Loggie case was heard yesterday afternoon and the A. & R. Loggie case was taken up. This is the most important before the court.
